TWO-PILOT CREW FOR SWISSAIR'S AIRBUS A310

SWISSAIR's positive experience with 2-man crews on it shorthaul jet aircraft dates back some 20 years - and its large fleet of two-pilot DC9s (some 34-strong at present), has been operated without problem since 1966.

This firsthand experience is backed up by the results of several in-depth studies conducted in various countries. They show that aircraft with a 2-

man cockpit crew is no more accident or incident prone than those operated with a complement of 3 crew members. The pilot workload on the A310 has been reduced in comparison with the DC9. Specifically, this has been achieved through simplified i.e. improved display of air and systems data, easier navigation, better system redundancy (important systems are duplicated) and a logical clearcut presentation of the measures necessary to correct possible faults.

SWISSAIR's decision to crew the A310 with 2 pilots will not lead to any loss of jobs.

To ensure that SWISSAIR is able to operate the A310 in 1983 as envisaged, however, certain conditions have to be fulfilled. Firstly, the manufacturer must observe all contractual provisions of a technical and operational nature this they will doubtless be able to do. Secondly, the aircraft must satisfy the requirements of the certification authorities, i.e. the French and German Air Offices. Finally, the Swiss supervisory authorities, namely the Federal Office for Civil Aviation, have to grant an operating permit.

In the USA, President Reagan has given an expert task force the job of examining the question of 2-3 man crews for new aircraft by the end of June. Naturally SWISSAIR will take into account the findings of this group insofar as any new aspects are brought to light in their deliberations.

The cockpit associations with whom SWISSAIR collaborated in the specification of the A310 aircraft have their own views on the crew issue. SWISSAIR hopes, nevertheless, that they will be able to accept the reasons for its decision so that the entry into service of the A310 in two years time can proceed harmoniously. Optimizing the safety of passengers has always been SWISSAIR's paramount objective. In its decisions, both now and in the future, there will be no deviation from this vital criterion.




