Exhibition at the Tate Gallery, Jean Tinguely, 8 September to 28 November 1982


This important exhibition of the work of the Swiss sculptor Jean Tinguely is of appeal to both adults and children. The artist is being shown here in depth for the first time, though he is well known on the Continent and in America. Tinguely, born in 1925, went to Paris in the early 'fifties where he started to make a series of abstract reliefs and constructions in wire and metal, their painted cut-out shapes made to move with the aid of electric motors. In 1960, after a visit to New York where he met Rauschenberg and Johns, his sculptures became larger, and were built of scrap metal, rusty wheels and other junk or found objects.

Movement and sound are an integral part of Tinguely's work. Inspired by the anarchic spirit of Dada, his functioning but useless machines have a crazy, unpredictable life of their own which can amuse, surprise or seem to threaten the spectator. Tinguely has made sculptures which squirt water, throw balls, crush bottles or plates, make abstract paintings, emit a variety of loud noises and even destroy themselves—as at the Museum of Modern Art in New 1960. Spectator in York involvement occupies a key place in Tinguely's thinking. We hope visitors will find little difficulty in seeing the point-or perhaps pointlessness-of his machines. Since the mid-1960s his works have tended to be monumental in scale, some of them suggestive of monsters, half animal.

machine. Their movements are often a grotesque parody of human actions.

The exhibition includes over 40 sculptures from all phases of Tinguely's career, with particular emphasis on the work of the early 'sixties. In 1960 Tinguely was cofounder of the *Nouveau Réaliste* group in Paris and the catalogue for this exhibition examines his relationship with other artists such

as Klein, Spoerri, Arman, Cesar and Niki de Saint Phalle. Drawings for specific works are included in the exhibition as well as a showcase containing manifestos, photographs of 'Happenings' (of which Tinguely was a pioneer) and other documentary material. The BBC Monitor film on Tinguely (1964), with commentary by Richard Hamilton, will be shown on video in the exhibition.


Giacometti's Paris

Lithographs from Alberto Giacometti's Paris sans Fin.
The Arts Council touring exhibition Giacometti's Paris presents 68 of the lithographs which Giacometti drew for the book Paris sans Fin.

Giacometti recalled that he started work on the book about 1957 and that he made hundreds of drawings at different times. Many were drawn outdoors in the street, some from a car where the windscreen wipers give a strong impression of the artist's presence, many in the cafés he frequented and in the modest studio which he occupied for almost fifty years.

There are drawings made in the museum of the Paris zoo, drawings of his sculptures, nudes, and portraits of his wife Annette and brother Diego. The portfolio had been commissioned by Tériade, one of the great Parisian art publishers. Giacometti wrote his last notes for the text in the autumn of 1965, and it was published in 1969, three years after his death. Alberto Giacometti had been born in the Italian speaking part of Switzerland in 1901. He had come to Paris in 1922 and become deeply involved in the Surrealist movement. In 1935, however, he reverted to making sculptures again from observation and the last thirty years of his life were a constant struggle to communicate the reality of what he saw. His sculptures, paintings and drawings were recently seen in a major Arts Council touring exhibition.

The present exhibition also includes photographs of

Giacometti at work taken by the Swiss photographer Ernst Scheidegger. To coincide with the exhibition the Arts Council has published a small book illustrating many of the lithographs and with a recollection of Giacometti by Robin Campbell, former Director of Art at the Arts Council


