In the last issue I wrote about salads and dressings, as a way to eat lots of vegetables (fibre). Now for a change try to eat pizzimonio.

A Few Tips for Dips for Pizzimonio

(Cut any vegetables in small pieces and dip in sauce) Rose Island Dip

Mix: 4 tbsps mayonnaise; 4 tbsps sour cream; 1 tbsp tomato sauce; 2 tbsps finely chopped celery. Add salt, pepper and tobasco.

Sauce - Aioli

Mix: 5 tbsps mayonnaise; 2 tbsps yoghurt; 3 tbsps cream; 4 pieces of garlic; 2 tbsps chives. Add salt, pepper and cayenne pepper.

Curry Dip

Mix: 2 tbsps mayonnaise; ½ apple, finely grated; lemon juice; 1 tbsp coconut; 1 tbsp curry; ½ cup sour cream. Add salt.

White Radish-Pepper Dip

Mix: 1 cup cream cheese; 3 tbsps cream; 1 tbsp white radish (grated); 1 tbsp green peppercorns; 1 tbsp chives. Add salt, cayenne pepper.

Basler Leckerli

Since the 14th century this biscuit speciality has been manufactured in Basle, that is at a time when sugar was still an unknown thing in Europe.

Our forefathers used pure honey to sweeten their biscuits. Much has changed in the world since then, but this recipe has remained unchanged.

The same raw materials are still used. The Basler Leckerli must be hard and crisp. Biscuits are broken in halves and you just let them melt in your mouth. This is the right way to eat them and to enjoy the particularly delicious flavour of this excellent biscuit, but should you prefer softer Leckerli, then do as granny does, put the Leckerli in a tin and add half a carrot or half a potato. After a day or two the Leckerli will be soft.

Recipe: 16 oz flour; 9 oz sugar; 16 oz honey; 9 oz nuts; 1-2 tsp lemon juice; 1 tsp cinnamon; 150g mixed peel; ½ tsp cloves; 2 tsp baking powder; Kirsch (1-2 tsp) (or to your taste).

Warm together honey, sugar and half a glass of water. Remove from heat and add nuts, peel, cinnamon and all other ingredients.

Bake in 3mm dish at 350°F until firm at the touch.

THIS AND THAT FROM SWITZERLAND

— The SBG (Schweiz Gewerkschaftsbund) called the 10th AHV revision a poor and sickly child. It would ask for disappointment from the women's side and only partial approval by the invalids.

— After Geneva, Basle and Neuchatel Berne was the fourth city to open a university for the seniors, above 60 years old. Interest was keen. About 1000 people enrolled and some had to be put on a waiting list, because of lack of facilities.

- Unemployment on the rise - in February numbers rose to 30,380 or 1%, but it was mostly due to seasonal unemployment.

- 350 guests filled the Grossmuenster in Zuerich to celebrate the 500th birthday of the reformator Zwingli.

- If everything goes according to plan the federal budget at the end of the period in 1987 will have shrunk to a mere 50 mio sfrs. But it will only be possible if subsidies are cut down further and if people agree to a few more special taxations. - 1983 was a record year for bankruptcies. More than 1915 firms and businesses had to close down.

— The Bundesrat finally agreed to an emergency legislation regarding the dying forests. In March 1984 a new law should come out to keep pollution at a minimum level.

— A Swiss mountaineering expedition climbed the highest mountain in South America, the 7000m high Aconcagua in the Andes. Leader was Stefan Woerner, with Andreas Reinhard, Joseph Buholzer and Peter Kocsi.

— During a 14 hour marathon operation a doctor at the University hospital in Zuerich sewed an arm that was cut off in an accident, back on again. Whether the operation will be a complete success or not can not be determined until quite some time later, one of the doctors in charge said. But so far they are pleased with the results. Circulation of the blood was coming back nicely and even a partially useful arm would be far better than a prosthesis.

SWISS TURBINES FOR JORDAN

The plant required for the King Talal dam, the first hydro-electric power station in Jordan, will be supplied by Swiss and German industry.


The Jordan Valley Authority, Amman (Jordan), has in fact just approved the order for two horizontal Francis turbines with an output of 3 MW each, together with governors and valves, generators and electrical equipment.

This order has been awarded to a consortium headed by the Bell Engineering Works Ltd, at Kriens (Switzerland), a Sulzer-Escher Wyss compay. The suppliers of the turbines with governors and valves are Bell, of the generators Garbe-Lahmeyer (Germany) and of the electrical equipment BBC Mannheim (Germany). Harza Engineers, Chicago (USA) are acting as consultants.

The Sulzer-Escher Wyss group has announced that it has also signed a 5-year agreement with an American company, the Electric Power Research Institute (EPRI). Valued at 6.28 million dollars, this contract gives the Swiss company the responsibility for improving the design of the feed pumps used in thermal power stations heated by fossil fuel.

The project is aimed in particular at designing and constructing new, more reliable and more efficient feed pumps. The results achieved will make it possible to produce improved components for all manufacturers. As a consequence, pumps already in service could be re-equipped.

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MILLIONS FOR ENERGY RESEARCH IN SWITZERLAND

14.6 million francs is the total amount allotted to the Swiss National Fund for Energy Research (NEFF) in 1982 by the four contributing organisations, that is to say the petroleum, coal, gas and electricity industries.

These subsidies were granted for applied energy research in the following sectors: Primary energy sources (solar, geothermal, biomass, wind, nuclear fusion), transformation, transport and storage of energy (heating from a distance, conservation, hydrogen and electrical techniques), security and protection of the environment, as well as economy measures and systems studies.

The largest share was once again allotted to solar energy (23.3%), followed by electrical technology (17.1%), security and the study of the environment (14.5%), as well as energy saving (14.2%). The proportion allotted to the other sectors varies between 0.6 and 4.4%.


THE SWISS AND BEER

In 1982, the world production of beer totalled 968.5 million hectolitres. In absolute value, the biggest producer remains the United States (228 million hl), followed by West Germany (94.8 million hl) and the USSR (68 million hl).

Switzerland, for its part, produced only 4.24 million hl, which is the equivalent of 0.43% of the world output. This proportion is however 4.5 times higher than that of its inhabitants in the population of the world.

From the point of view of per capita output (66.1 litres), Switzerland compares favourably with the international average.





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
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
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
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


NIGERIAN CONTRACT FOR APROFIM LTD

The Real Estate Promotion and Financing Agency Ltd (Aprofim), Geneva, specialising in construction work, has just been awarded a contract worth 110 million naira (about 3.5 million Swiss francs) in connection with the construction of four hotels and six shopping centres in the State of Kaduna, in the north of Nigeria.

The contract concerns two hotels, each with 200 rooms, costing 78 million and 58.5 million francs respectively and two motels with 75 rooms costing a total of 31.5 million francs.

As for the six shopping centres, they will each cover 5,000 m² divided into 1,000 units, as well as including a mosque and a police station. The financing of this project will be similar to that of other Aprofim contracts, that is to say 75% with offshore funds and the remainder in national currency. (SODT).

SWITZERLAND'S TIMBER EXPORTS

In 1982, there were some 405,000 acres of forests in Switzerland. Three cantons alone, Berne (63,200 acres), the Grisons (55,800) and the Ticino (45,700) account for 40% of the total productive forestry area of the country.

If we add two other cantons well supplied with forests, Vaud (35,200 acres) and Valais (34,800), we then have 57% of the total area of forests in Switzerland.

As shown by the latest forestry statistics, the volume of timber felled in Swiss forests in 1982 amounted to 141 million cu.ft. Although this quantity showed a drop of about 12 million cu.ft. compared with the two previous years, it still exceeded the average for the last ten years by 2.8 million cu.ft.

Of the total volume of timber marketed, some 21 million cu.ft. was exported in 1982 in the form of raw timber. Simultaneously, imports of raw timber amounted to about 12.4 million cu.ft., which means that the country had access to about 134 million cu.ft. As domestic consumption amounted to 219 million cu.ft., there was as a result a shortage of 85 million cu.ft. on the home market, which had to be made up with imports of semi-manufactured timber as well as paper and cardboard.

BIG ORDER FROM HONG KONG

Phonex Ltd in Zurich has been awarded one of the largest single orders ever made for metal accoustic ceilings.

These ceilings, valued at a total of 8.5 million Swiss francs, are destined for Exchange Square, the stock exchange complex in the process of construction in Hong Kong. This new complex occupies an excellent position on the island: it has two 50-storey towers and a communicating wing in which Hong Kong's four Stock Exchanges will be housed.

The principals, the Hong Kong Land Company Ltd, and the general contractor, the Gammon Building Construction Ltd, have chosen Phonex for its outstanding plans for the project and also because it succeeded in fulfilling all requirements from both the architectural and the technical points of view.

The delivery of the 100,000m² (over a million square feet) of metal ceilings is scheduled to be completed by next summer.

This big order, obtained through Hafina Ltd, Baar, brings new proof of Swiss competitiveness on overseas markets.
