Editorial:

Dear readers, dear compatriots,

The Australian state of New South Wales is officially free from bushfires for the first time in more than 240 days, the area's fire service announced in February. Months of devastating fires in Australia left at least 28 people dead and about 3,000 homes destroyed. Devastation inflicted on fauna and flora is too great to be expressed in numbers.

The fires were brought under control in part thanks to torrential rains, emanating from the rainy season in the tropical North. But the downpours brought major flooding, damaging winds and dangerous surf. Heavy rainfall across eastern Australia led to the evacuation of several towns and scores of schools were closed.

The fire service reported that the rains helped to extinguish more than 30 fires over one weekend, describing it as the "most positive news we've had in some time." Australia faces a fire season every summer, but it had already had months of extreme heat and one of the worst droughts on record when this one began. The heavy rainfall brought some relief to many drought-affected areas, causing people on the land to rejoice. But they also reminded us that much more sustained rainfall is needed to finally break this drought.

"Vom Regen in die Traufe" or "out of the frying pan and into the fire" – as one disaster is finally over, our region and the world face yet another in COVID-19! This rapidly spreading virus has by the first week in March caused over 4,000 fatalities worldwide. As we go to print, no one knows when it will be brought under control.

If the natural disasters or the pandemic has caused you, as a Swiss citizen in Australia, any financial hardship, please remember that there are three Swiss benevolent/care societies that are here to help.

Apart from strange panic-buying behaviour, COVID-19 has also resulted in severe economic downturn and the cancellation of many large-scale events. Prestigious award for humbling work

Swiss-born Jean-Pierre (John) Reifler left behind a life of criminal activity and alcohol addiction when he migrated to Australia in 1969 for a fresh start. And what an amazing turn-around he was able to achieve!

He met Annette (Honi), his wife-to-be at the Coffs Harbour Baptist Church in 1972. It was a match made in heaven that led to the foundation of the Sherwood Cliffs Christian Rehabilitation Centre which has helped hundreds of people to overcome addiction.

And now John and Honi are the latest recipients of the pre-eminent Australian award, the Medal of the Order of Australia (OAM) for 'service to community health', a recognition both so richly deserve. This is the third time in five years that a Swiss citizen in Australia has been bestowed such an honour.

The couple share a deep Christian faith. They were reaching out to young troubled people but soon realised that simply providing food and shelter was not enough. They felt the need to set up a place where people can have time to grow physically, mentally and spiritually. In 1978 they bought the Sherwood Cliffs property, located 50km north west of Coffs Harbour in New South Wales. The Rehabilitation Centre features dormitory-style accommodation for up to eight single men and two married couples with children. It also operates a farm providing much of the produce for the centre.

The Reiflers refer to those staying at the centre not as clients or patients but as 'seekers'. Over the years Jean-Pierre estimates 800 seekers have been helped finding a better life. When they began working with addicts in the early 70s, they dealt mostly with marijuana, magic mushroom and LSD, but now the main problem is ice – "such an explosive, cruel drug hitting harder and quicker", Honi laments.

Much has changed since the early days in terms of compliance and regulations, but with their eldest daughter Chantal and husband Colin taking over the reins as they move into retirement (although Jean-Pierre refuses to use the term) they say they are heading in the right direction.

The Reiflers have six children – two were adopted after their biological mother overdosed – and 20 grandchildren. They described receiving the OAM as a great honour and very humbling.

A friendship of equals

There were few places as different in the mid-19th century than Neuchâtel and the Yarra Ranges, near Melbourne. But despite the contrast, when the de Pury family travelled from the Swiss canton to start a new life in the colony of Victoria, they swiftly forged an enduring relationship with a local Indigenous leader.

William Barak became important to the newly-settled Europeans, especially to Baron Frédéric Guillaume de Pury and his sons.

“They were people who were there,” said Guill de Pury, Guillaume’s grandson, referring to the local Wurundjeri people. “It was their country and we were happy to interact with them.” What marked out the relationship between the leader of the local Indigenous population and the recent arrivals was that mutual regard was above any issues of race. “I think first of all

they were neighbours,” said Brooke Collins, a Wurundjeri woman and the great-great-niece of Barak. “They were also farmers. You have the de Purys with their beautiful grapes and you’ve got the people at Coranderrk with their award-winning hops. I’m sure there would have been similarities affecting their crops and I’m wondering if they would have had to share resources and tips and tricks.” “They must have seen each other as equals, as friends and allies otherwise the relationship simply wouldn’t have worked.” Brooke Collins said.

Coranderrk was a government Aboriginal reserve established in 1860 that quickly became self-sufficient. It stood close to the Yeringberg property run by the de Purys which was developing as a notable winery. Proximity and

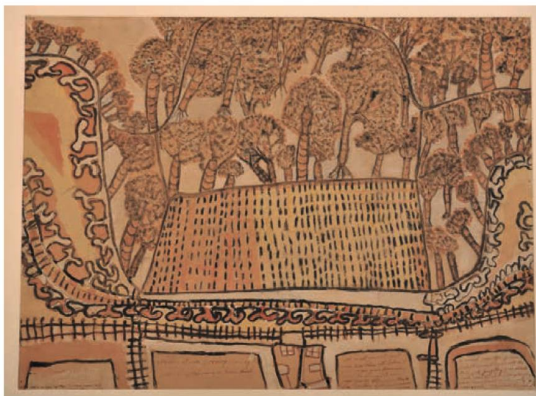
location are integral to this story. William Barak lived for 40 years at Coranderrk from 1863 to his death in 1903, then on the other side, there’s the de Pury family who established Yeringberg in 1863 and who are still there today.

Guill de Pury recalled hearing his father talk about spending time with Barak. “Father always told stories about what he did when he was younger and Barak was obviously someone he associated with quite a lot,” he said. “Barak would have been much older, but I think my father really liked going out into the bush with him and being taught by Barak how to hunt and things like that.”

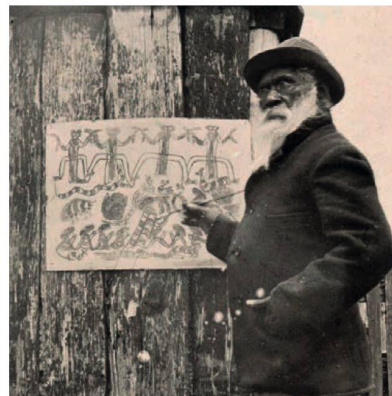
It was Guill’s father who went hunting with Barak. That’s only one generation removed. Guill de Pury values a different outlook on life and humanity that his forebears brought from Europe. “They came from Switzerland which is a multicultural, multilingual country,” he said. “And I think that possibly made them more tolerant of other kinds of cultures or customs.” That idea has support from Brooke Collins. “Perhaps the Swiss family was slightly separate to all the others. They were perhaps seen in that minority, which absolutely the Aboriginal people were. So perhaps that was also common ground.”

This 19th-century close relationship between a squatter and an Indigenous leader is so unusual and historically important, not just for Australia, but also for our Swiss community.

Carl Lutz – the Swiss man who saved tens of thousands of Jews

The story of this important yet largely unknown Swiss figure began in March 1944 when Nazi Germany invaded Hungary. In order to save tens of thousands of Hungarian Jews, a whole network was put in place in Budapest over the course of several months to save as many as possible.

Behind this was Vice-Consul Carl Lutz, the Head of the foreign interest at the Swiss legation since 1942. Unwilling to turn away the hundreds of Jews who thronged the entrance to the Swiss legation every day, he came up with the idea of ‘Schutzbriefe’ (safe conduct documents or protective letters). After tough negotiations with Lutz, the Nazis and the Hungarian government reluctantly granted him the permission to issue 8,000 ‘Schutzbriefe’, which

helped Jewish families to prevent deportation while waiting to emigrate to Palestine. Lutz also managed to extend diplomatic protection to 76 buildings throughout Budapest that housed, fed and helped Jews. One of the buildings, ‘The Glass House’, became the center of his activities. There, the Zionist youth movement oversaw the huge logistical task of fabricating immigration and protection papers. They were assisted by the International Committee of the Red Cross, other Swiss and foreign diplomats, along with important members of the Jewish community.

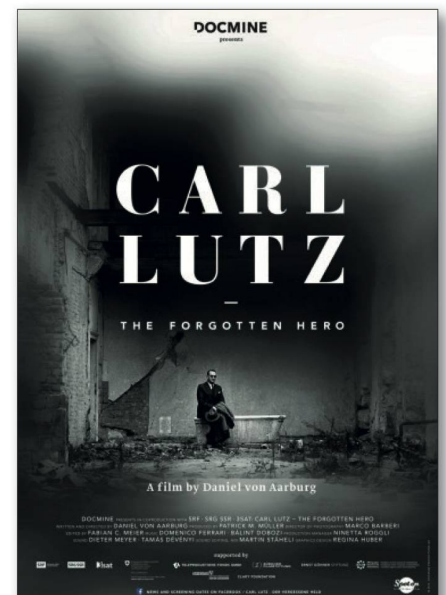
Until the autumn of 1944, Lutz, with the unflinching support of his wife Gertrud, pulled out all the stops, going so far as to hide Jews in his car and intervene in the forced marches of Jews toward the Austrian border. By war’s end, close to 124,000 Hungarian Jews survived and nearly half of them owed their life to the courageous actions of Carl Lutz.

For his leadership of one of the largest rescue operations during Second World War, recognition came from abroad: Lutz was nominated several times for the Nobel Peace Prize and was the first Swiss national elevated to the rank of ‘Righteous Among the Nations’ by Yad Vashem, Israel’s official memorial to the Holocaust, in 1964.

2020 coincides with the 125th anniversary of Carl Lutz’s birth. The Consulate General of Switzerland in Sydney is marking the event with the screening of the 2014-documentary film ‘Carl Lutz – The forgotten Hero’ from Swiss film director Daniel von Aarburg. In the film, Lutz’s stepdaughter, Agnes Hirschi tells his incredible story, complemented by statements of witnesses from all around the world, people who survived the Holocaust thanks to Carl Lutz.

Announcements about screenings of the film will be forthcoming in due time.
