The recent Swiss Abroad Congress in St. Gallen united voices for change. Alongside UK colleagues Michelle, Loredana, Franz, and Andreas, OSA representatives from worldwide locations gathered. Central discussions revolved around the upcoming 2023 elections, providing opportunities to engage with major political parties. The OSA spent a year crafting a manifesto outlining core demands, utilised by delegates in government advocacy. The manifesto is available on SwissCommunity's website.

Notably, UK members Franz Muheim and Loredana Guegt-Wyatt stand as candidates in the upcoming elections, aiming to draw Swiss authorities' attention to expatriate needs. E-voting remained a focal point, with Basel-Stadt, St. Gallen, and Thurgau successfully testing and implementing the system for the October elections, setting a promising precedent.

A significant revelation emerged: the Swiss diaspora now surpasses 800,000, a 34% surge since 2002. While only 227,000

are officially registered in their cantons, our collective influence matches the voting populations of Tessin and Valais. Strengthening our presence on electoral rolls is crucial for enhanced representation.

The congress established two new Committees: one focused on lobbying and communications, the other championed by Andreas Feller, advocating for the direct election of OSA representatives.

In 2024, the 100th OSA congress will convene in Lucerne. Leveraging a century of experience, OSA aims to enhance support for Swiss expatriates worldwide, fostering community engagement and empowerment.

FOSSUK AGM 2023: Fostering community bonds and engagement

The FOSSUK AGM 2023, held on June 17th at the Swiss Embassy in London, featured distinguished guests, including Mr. Laurent Perriard, Deputy Director General at the Consular Directorate of the Swiss Federal Department of Foreign Affairs (FDFA), Mr. Thomas Wagner – Consul General at the Embassy, and Ms. Chantal Moser – Deputy Ambassador at the Embassy of Switzerland in London.

Mr. Filippo Lombardi, President of the Organisation of the Swiss Abroad (OSA), joined to support our local community and introduce OSA's initiatives for the 5th Switzerland. Additionally, the Swiss Communication Agency Sagl unveiled their project, SwissCommunity.org's Factor-Swiss (see Page 3).

The AGM hosted a thought-provoking panel discussion on 'Living and Working in the UK post-pandemic and Brexit in the midst of a cost of living crisis.' Led by Swiss students in the UK and moderated by CSA UK Delegate, Michelle Hufschmid, the session included special guest Dr.iur. Nicole Töpperwien, CEO of Soliswiss. The interactive Q&A encouraged collaboration and understanding.

Loredana Guegt-Wyatt, President of the New Helvetic Society, curated a cultural program, spotlighting Swiss

painter Carine Hayoz and sculptor Maritta Winter. Their art, showcased at the Embassy, offered insight into Swiss artistic expression, sparking conversations and connections. Swiss singer Marie Roze's performance left a lasting impression on attendees. The evening continued with a gracious Apéro courtesy of the Swiss Embassy.

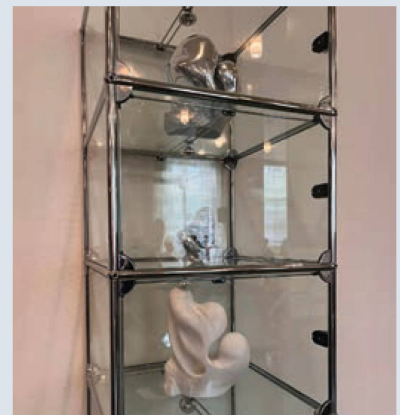
For those present, an informal dinner at Soho's renowned St. Moritz restaurant concluded a day filled with reflection, engagement, and celebration.

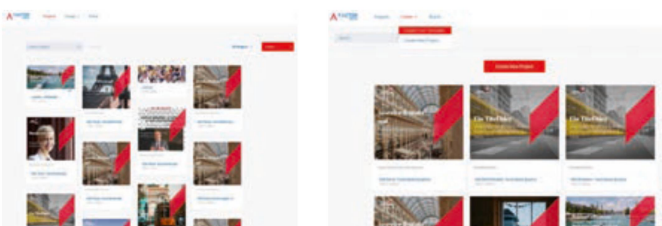

Reviving history: Unione Ticinese's logo redesign chronicles 150 years of legacy

Unione Ticinese, a UK club steeped in 150 years of history (#UT150), has profoundly influenced London's cultural landscape. In honour of its sesquicentennial, a graphic design agency was entrusted with reimagining the association's logo. We ask the Swiss designer, Michele Jannuzzi, Director of Jannuzzi-Smith Studio in London, to uncover the creative process.

Swiss Review: What's the process behind the logo redesign?

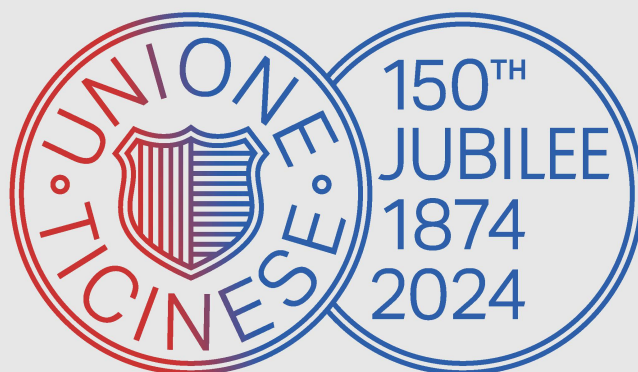
Michele Jannuzzi: We embarked on extensive research, delving into Unione Ticinese London's historical documents and online resources. A recurrent symbol stood out: two shields bearing Ticinese and Swiss flags. This unique shield shape, used since the club's early days, suggested an original physical source of inspiration, probably a plate or an image in possession of the club, inspiring that peculiar shield's shape. Our goal was to forge a historical link, creating a contemporary logo rooted in the club's heritage.

SR: How did you explore the visual heritage of the UT?

MJ: The St. Bride Foundation and our studio's graphic library were invaluable. They provided insight into fonts and designs prevalent in the late 19th and early 20th centuries. We identified a font frequently used by Unione Ticinese, offering it as one of three logo options. The aim was not replication but drawing inspiration from the past to craft a modern emblem.

SR: What's the concept behind the colour choice?

MJ: Red and blue hues in the logo adhere to heraldic norms, employing vertical and horizontal lines, respectively. To evoke the Ticinese flag, we took inspiration from an old typographic technique called "iris." This involved blending two colours on a printing roller, creating a gradient effect reminiscent of late 1800s printing.

SR: How did you choose the font and why?

MJ: While aesthetics played a role, we also honoured Swiss typographic tradition. Initially considering Adrian Frutiger's Univers, we ultimately chose Bruno Maag's Active Grotesk. Maag is Swiss and his font perfectly merged contemporary graphic and aesthetic needs, offering a strong, legible typeface in line with the logo's intended spirit.

SR: Why did you design a double-sided coin symbol?

MJ: The double-sided coin medal was a client requirement, symbolizing both the celebration of the 150th anniversary and a long-lasting logo. This commemorative medal bears the Unione Ticinese logo on one side, a permanent fixture, and a dedicated anniversary face on the other, designed for later removal. In rebranding Unione Ticinese's logo, our aim was to fuse historical resonance with contemporary relevance, ensuring that the emblem would stand as a testament to the club's enduring legacy.

5: Nathaniel Cartier – aspiring Roger Federer of Swiss music

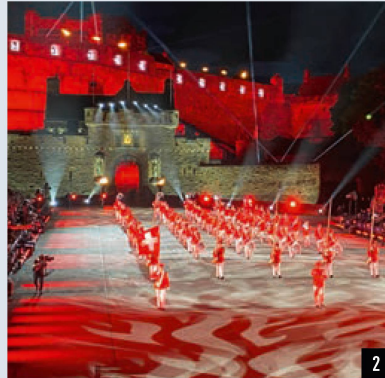
Nathaniel Cartier, Swiss musician based in Edinburgh, aims to mirror Roger Federer’s global stature in music.

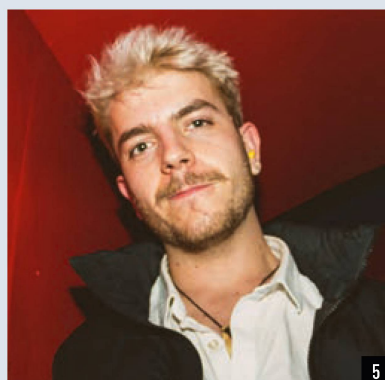

Remembering Dr Malcolm Pender: Renowned scholar of German-Swiss literature

Professor Malcolm Pender, a distinguished figure in German-Swiss literature, passed away at 87. Glasgow-born, he excelled in French and German at the University of Cambridge.

He pursued his doctorate on Frisch and joined the inaugural University of Strathclyde, where he devoted his entire career. An eminent scholar in German-speaking Swiss literature, he authored numerous articles and books, co-founding the Centre for Swiss Cultural Studies.

His presence at Solothurner Literaturtage forged valuable connections with scholars and writers who became cherished friends. Malcolm was known for his principled stance on topics like Brexit and the British class system, engaging in spirited debates with humility. He showed genuine interest in students and younger peers, generously sharing his knowledge and vast network. Balancing work and life adeptly, he cherished opera, fine dining, vibrant hues, trips to Switzerland, and cherished moments with loved ones.

He took delight in revisiting Maigret novels and regaling in humorous tales, finding profound happiness in his partnership with his late wife Ute and their two daughters.

Malcolm remained active in teaching and research until only a few years prior. The world of German-Swiss literature and the world in general have lost an excellent scholar and a fine man, who leaves behind him a wonderful personal and professional legacy.

Peter's funeral was held on September 25.
