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what it may. Order: It is innate in us, and I am convinced that with the help of all good citizens it can be preserved without difficulty. They will also appreciate that the Government must act, fully conscious of its responsibility, and that it will fulfil its duties towards the outside world, and within the country, above all parties, in the service of all Swiss, who are sons of one and the same soil.

Compatriots, it is up to you to follow the Government as a sure and devoted guide, who will not always be in a position to state, to explain and give reasons for its decisions. Events march swiftly, we have to adjust ourselves to their rhythm. Only in this way shall we be able to secure the future. Personal, regional and party differences of opinion will merge together in the melting pot of national interest, which is the supreme law.

Compatriots. Close your ranks behind the Federal Council, remain calm, as it too is calm, remain steadfast, as it too is steadfast, have confidence, as it too has confidence. Heaven will lend us its protection also in the future, if we prove worthy of it. Courage and determination, spirit of self-sacrifice, are the redeeming virtues. Through them our free, humane, understanding and hospitable fatherland will be in a position to continue to fulfil its brotherly mission which is inspired by the great European cultures. Swiss, my brethren, in a manner worthy of the past, let us step out into the future, courageously and whole-heartedly. God may watch over us.

What a generous heap of solidly and beautifully knitted woollen wear we have been able to collect here at Wellington. I am only sorry that the thoughtful donors are scattered all over the country and therefore cannot enjoy with me this mass of good will. How many of our countrymen at home, men, women and children, will rejoice to receive these warm gifts and will gratefully think of the donors in the wide world. In comparison with what has been collected everywhere in this country for the warrefugees in England and where I know every Swiss woman in New Zealand is doing her part too, our collection is only small, and we have the satisfaction of knowing that our efforts for Switzerland cannot in any way hurt what is being done here.

Warm clothing has also been sent to Switzerland from many other countries and these donations surely will be a blessing for those who are in need of it. I wish to express on this occasion to all those who have so generously contributed to this collection my heartfelt thanks. In view of the fact that the economic difficulties confronting Switzerland will tend to aggravate the sufferings of many of our fellow-countrymen and their children at home, I do not have the heart to bring the collection to an end. I shall therefore be as grateful as ever for further gifts of woollen wear, especially children's and women's stockings and women's and men's pullovers.
