FROM SWITZERLAND NEWS

IN THE SNOW OF THE SIERRAS

A company in Zurich, which specialises in the manufacture of machines for clearing away snow, has received an order for a snow-plough from the official network of the Spanish Railways. This order comprises two automatic rail-cars, driven by a diesel engine and equipped with Rolba snow rotaries; one is intended for the normal Spanish railway network and the other for a mountain railway. These machines, weighing 25 and 20 tons, will be built entirely in Switzerland and will be delivered in the summer of 1962.

THIRTIETH ANNIVERSARY OF SWISSAIR

It was thirty years ago, on March 26th, 1931, that the Swiss Air Navigation Company, "Swissair," was founded, through the merging of two existing companies, one at Basle and the other at Zurich. At the start, it possessed a capital amounting to 800,000 Swiss francs, 22 aircraft with a total seating capacity of 88, and a network of 4302 kilometres, which was flown exclusively in fine weather, and only during the period elapsing between March and October. At the present time, Swissair's sharecapital amounts to 105 million Swiss francs, its operational network extends over 139,292 kilometres and comprises all the continents, except Australia. Although the number of the company's aircraft has only increased by half during these thirty years-there are now 32 machines available -the number of seats has increased to 2345, i.e. it is now nearly 27 times greater.

MINTING OF SWISS AND FOREIGN COINAGE

During the course of last year, the Federal Mint, in Berne, minted for the Federal Treasury 49 million coins to the total value of 22.6 million Swiss francs. Moreover, it minted coins and medals for foreign countries to the value of 2.4 million Swiss francs.

SWISS AWARDED "INVENTORS" OSCAR"

At the Inventors' Exhibition, at Brussels, the 1961 "Oscar" for the most outstanding invention has been awarded to a Swiss inventor, Mr Guignard, for his apparatus for tying up plants. This Guignard "tyer-up," which uses a special fibre for binding, which is more advantageous than the usual fibres employed for this purpose, is made in the shape of a pistol; it attaches the plants, branches of trees, vines, etc., automatically and more firmly and more rapidly, to the props, poles or trellises.

RECIPE

RAMEQUIN

Mix well 4 egg yolks with 1 pint cream, add $\frac{1}{4}$ lb of medium cheese (Gryere is nice if available) grated and a pinch of salt. Incorporate the stiffly beaten egg whites. Grease well a fireproof dish. Line it with 4-5 thin slices of bread, which have preferably been dipped in melted butter. Pour mixture over the top of bread and let brown in a very hot oven. Serve immediately. -R.B.
