A few years later he went to Mokoia to start farming and operate as a blacksmith. Some time later he bought a farm at Midhurst and worked it for 14 years. Emil retired in 1940 to live at Stratford. He was a very keen follower of the Swiss card game Jass and would travel many miles to have a game.

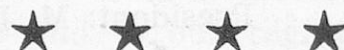
