The highlight of the day was the traditional Swiss Sport "Schwingen", which is so very popular in America and widely practiced over



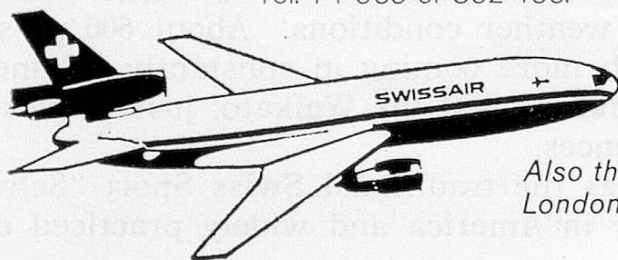
