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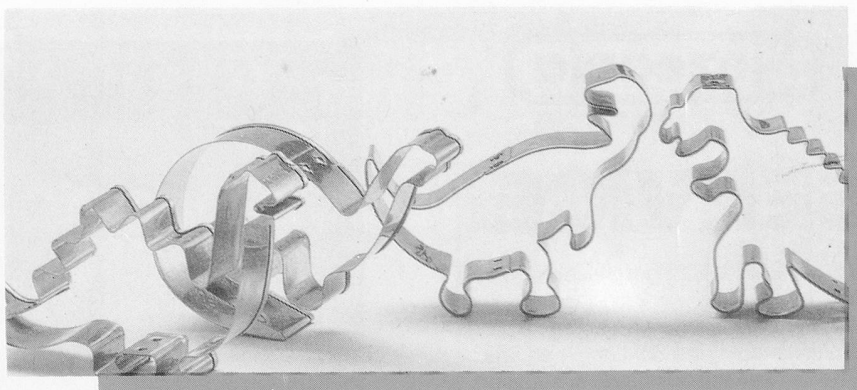
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DILEMMA IN FRIBOURG

NO END TO THE DINOSAUR BUSINESS

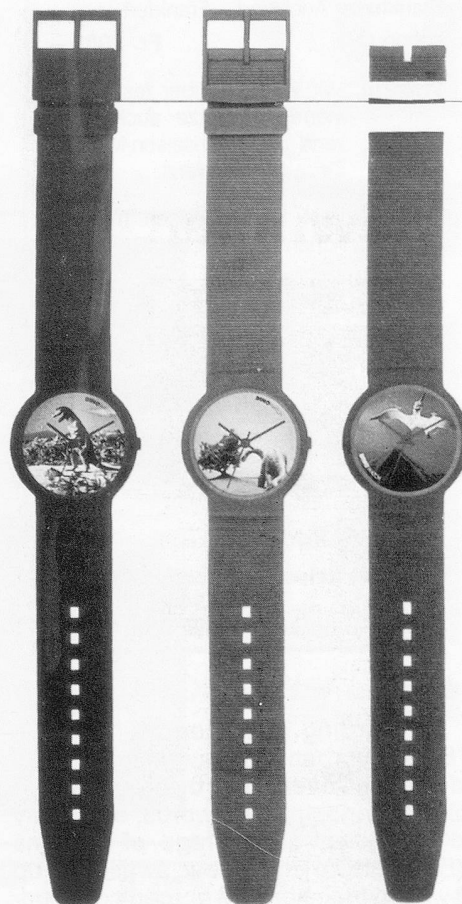
Switzerland is besotted with the dinosaurs. Latest craze: Dino Watches.
