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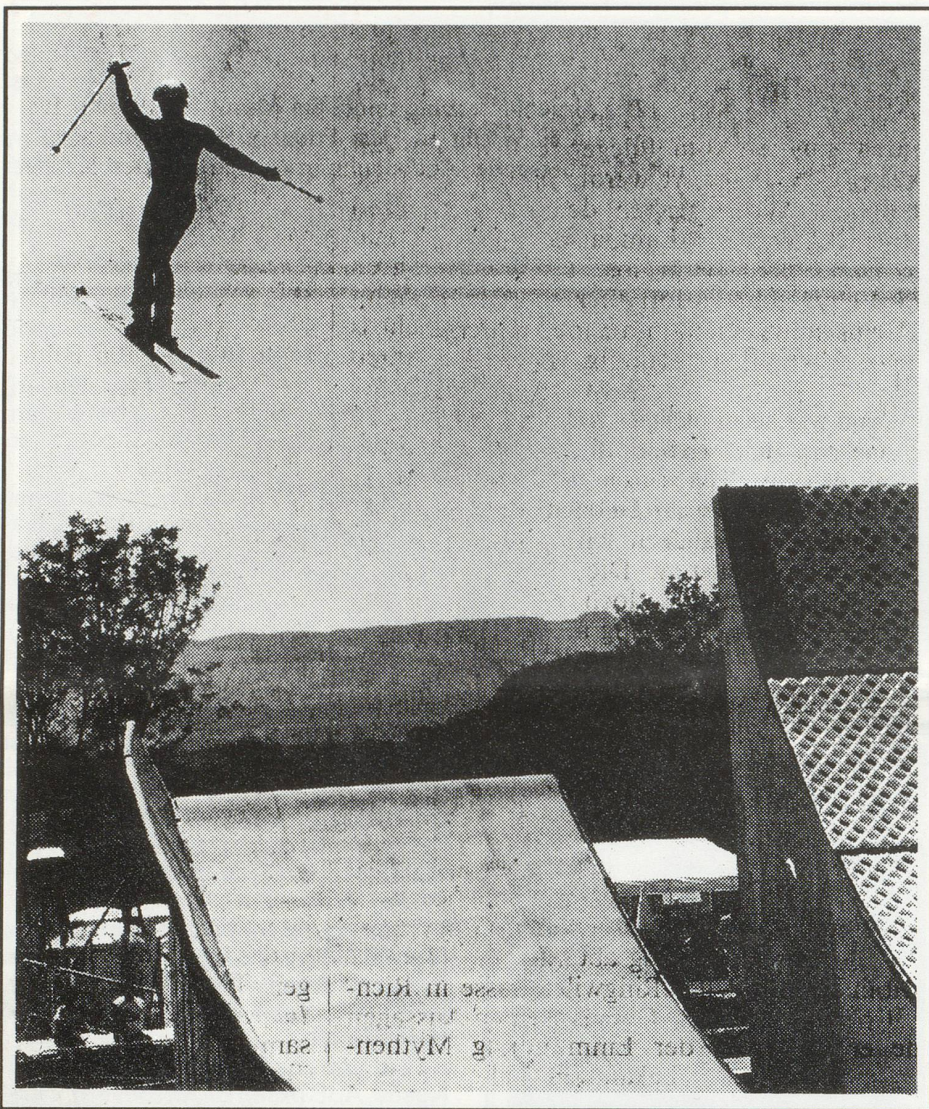
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From the five different spring boards, the acrobats can perfect their jumps into water at minimal risks.

WATER SKIING ?

Mettmenstetten (ZH) saw recently the opening of the first training centre in Switzerland for acrobatic ski jumping, another sport that is becoming increasingly popular amongst the thrill seeking skiers.

Five differently designed spring boards, all facing a 20 m by 25 m swimming pool, allow the skiers to train from the simplest salto to the most complicated triple salto with twists and pirouettes.

So, fully equipped with skis, sticks and helmet, the ski jumpers finish in a

big splash in the water at the end of each jump. Some of these skiers have even mastered the trick of swimming back to the edge of the pool with their skis still strapped to their feet.

Mettmenstetten has now become the summer training ground for the Swiss National acrobatic ski jumping and the snow boarding teams.
