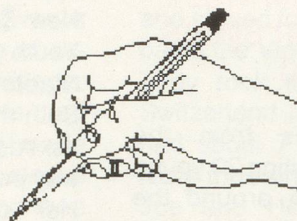

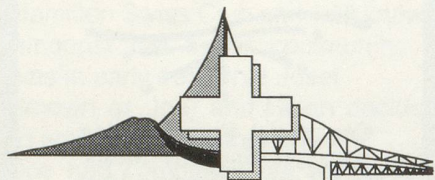

Josefina Marty née Styger

Josefina Styger was born in Rothenturm Switzerland on the 28 December 1913. Her father Karl Styger was a farmer who died at an early age during the influenza epidemic of 1918.

-Josefina and her mother lived in Rothenturm and it was there at St. Antonius Church on the 13 May 1938 that she married Alois Marty. They had four children, Theresia, Bertha (dec), Alois and Arthur.

Alois and Josefina emigrated to New Zealand in 1950. They worked on farms and sharemilked before purchasing their own farm at Korakonui, Te Awamutu in 1962.

A life long interest in breeding jersey cattle was started by the family in 1964, with the establishment of the Greenbelt stud prefix.

Alois predeceased Josefina in 1983. She continued to live on the farm until she entered San Michele Resthome in Te Awamutu where she passed away on the 23 February 1998.

Josefina is survived by three children, eight grandchildren and one great grandchild.

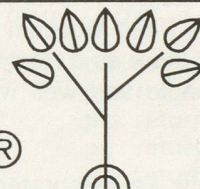

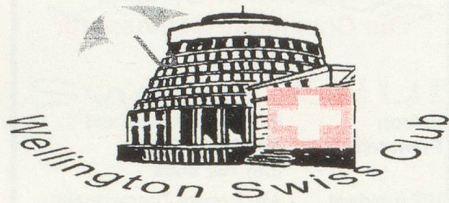

Pfister, had been the initiator of this special night. Leo Zehnder entertained us with his Accordion.

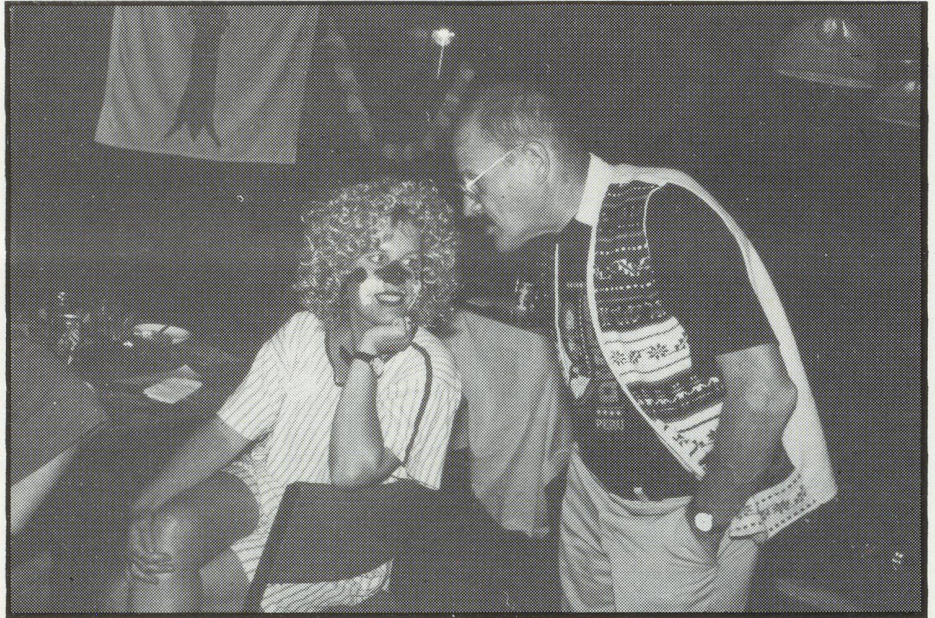
Thank you Leo and Doreen for specially coming down for the occasion.

THE ABBEY OF ST. GALL : A CULTURAL CENTRE

In Wellington from 17 April - 10 May 1998
and in Auckland from 21 May - 21 June 1998

This touring exhibition is an attempt to survey through the use of models, photographs, facsimiles, and replicas of charters, seals, maps, plans and manuscripts, the cultural heritage of the Abbey of St. Gall, Switzerland, as preserved in its various museums, libraries and archives.

- The famous baroque Abbey of St. Gall was founded in 612AD by Gallus, an itinerant monk, and between 750AD and the early-mid 1800s the Abbey was a leading centre for culture and learning with an emphasis on architecture, music, book script, translations and theology.

- The baroque library and the abbey church represent a high point in the culture of monastic architecture. Since 1983 the baroque and rococo precinct of the Abbey of St. Gall with its world-renowned Abbey Library, and the Abbey Archives which are more than 1200 years old, have been listed in the UNESCO catalogue of cultural treasures of the world.

- The Archives of the Abbey of St. Gall are jointly owned by the Canton of St. Gall and the Catholic community of the Canton, and contain the legal and administrative records of the former Abbey of St. Gall from about 750AD to its

secularisation in 1805. Altogether there are some 20,000 original charters, more than 2500 manuscripts, and countless other documents. From the period before the year 1000 alone, there are more than 700 parchment charters of gifts to the Abbey and nearly 100 Carolingian and Ottonian royal diplomas.

- The exhibition is prepared by the Abbey Archives of St. Gall (Switzerland) with support from the Canton of St. Gall, the Roman Catholic Community of the Canton of St. Gall, the City of St. Gall, Pro Helvetia-Arts Council of Switzerland, the Swiss Fund of the National Celebration Pro Patria, and The Moving Company (New Zealand).

Triple Gold for Swissair in Industry Poll Results

Swissair has earned three more top awards for the quality of its service product. The Best Short-Haul Airline and Best Short-Haul Business Class awards came from the London-based Executive Travel magazine. Swissair has often topped the Executive Travel list, having won several of the magazine's prestigious distinctions over the past few years. Executive Travel is one of the UK's top business travel magazines and

its annual awards are based on the finding and opinions of a special "flight check team" composed of frequent-flyer readers and editorial staff.

The Best European Airline for Business Travel was received at the Trophées de l'Aérien awards in Paris - a new series of awards bestowed by the French travel trade on the best airlines serving Paris.

And some statistics: Swissair flies 13 times daily between Zurich and Geneva. The Airline will shortly have

36 state-of-the-art ecofriendly twinjet Airbus operating on its European network. During the upcoming summer schedules, together with joint operations with its airline partners, Swissair will serve 152 destinations in 78 countries, including 27 weekly flights to or from New York, four daily between Zurich and Frankfurt, five non-stop services between San Francisco and Zurich per week, and after a break of several years, a reinstatement of three weekly flights to Jakarta via Singapore.
