Address by Society Patron: In the absence of Mrs Matteucci, Beatrice introduced Embassy Representative, Bernadette Hunkeler, and invited her to address the meeting. Bernadette noted the success of the recent visit by Mr Walter Thurnheer. and appreciated that so many Swiss Abroad came to his meetings. In trying to strengthen relations between the Embassy and members of the Swiss Clubs, every effort is being made, workload permitting, to attend AGMs and Club activities around the country. The Swiss Society brings most clubs together and works well in the common goal of keeping Swiss culture and spirit alive. The Helvetia magazine is a wonderful example of 'how to keep in touch with Switzerland' and complements official Swiss Abroad publication, Swiss Revue, in an exemplary fashion.

One big change happening in Switzerland will be the new passport as from 1st January 2003. Children will all have their own passports. They will be valid for ten years for adults, and three and five years for children and youths respectively. Passports can still be obtained through the Embassy, but it is recommended to apply for this at least two months before it is required. Current passports will still be valid, but from 1 January 2003 the Embassy can no longer extend current documents and new ones will be required.

President's Report: (Beatrice Leuenberger reported) This will be my final report after holding office since 1997, and so an opportune time to reflect on the past five years. The Society has run smoothly over the past 12 months - and we've again been busy with Helvetia production and Society administration. In 1997, membership was 494, and now (as at end March) there has been a net increase of 34 members, also taking into account members lost. Total membership is now 528, which includes 18 honorary members. This shows there is still a lot of interest in the Society - greatly helped by a magazine up to the standard of the Helvetia - both by new arrivals from Switzerland, through to second and third generation Swiss in New Zealand. Front page competitions have continued to be popular, with 8-12 entries each month; and prior to last Christmas, we asked children to draw a Christmas scene - for which they all received an advent calendar, complete with chocolates
