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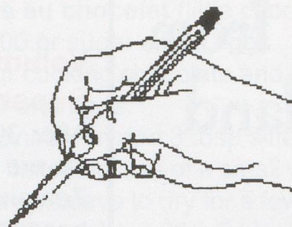
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New Zealand Swiss Club News & Happenings

This is especially for the families with children. Samichlaus would be delighted if the children could prepare some music or recite a poem for him. Parents please bring a plate for afternoon tea.

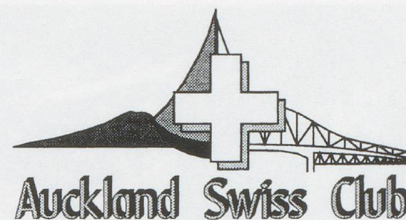

Welcome to our new members Hans and Alice Durrer, who have re-joined the club after some time away.

We have just been (that is on Sunday November 16) on our **Mystery Tour**, and this is what we did: Two dozen of us gathered early in the morning at Arataki Information Centre on Scenic Drive in the Waitakere Ranges. Once all the lost or late ones finally screamed into the carpark, we then headed down to Jacobsen Station, which is really a little railway station for the service rail for Watercare. There we were greeted by our friendly guide who explained the history of the railtrack, the water management in and around Auckland, and safety regulations for us, the participants, to observe. We clambered into the little wagons, not much bigger than a toy train. One side was open, the other had closed windows, and even a little gap window on the ceiling. We are to go through about 15 tunnels. We are to travel deep into the bush, following the route of the pipeline that brings the fresh clear water from the Waitakeres to

Onehunga, to the Upper Nihotupu Dam. The friendly guide who also drives the little train at about 20km/h, explains all sorts of facts about the tunnels which are mostly named after people involved with building the dams.

Apparently some wise councillor predicted in 1920 that one day Auckland would have to tap into the Waikato for its water supply, and whaddayano... in May 2002 this came true.

On the spot where about 16 hardened sacrificing workers had their campsite for the whole time the dam was built, there is now a pleasant picnic site and we had our first feed, a brunch with sausages and potato salad. We walked some way up and crossed the dam.

We take it for granted that we can just turn a tap on for a drink of water, and enjoy our daily shower without any thought. People before us actually made incredible efforts to make that possible for us, 3 people even lost their lives just for the one dam that we saw on our mystery tour.

Pointed out on the way back was a native orchid on the side of the track and some rock movement that manifests itself in one of the tunnels. Even some stalagmite is starting to form on their walls.

After our return to the starting point we drove off to a lookout where we had coffee and strawberry tarts. They were quickly devoured, and then we were subjected to a small quiz presented by Sandra Hess. She tested our knowledge in a wide variety of themes. This was a fun competition won by Christine and Martyn Williams, and of course was done with a lot of talking and joking. The sun was out and we just relaxed. When we had had enough we drove along a bit and stopped at the Fairy Falls, where we wandered for some time through the bush, not quite reaching the falls themselves as they seemed a bit too far away and too steep for some.

From there we got some instructions as

to where to go next. These brought us to all sorts of different places, and the writer of them now knows that giving instructions is not one of her strong points. Luckily we are all locals and kind of knew where we were heading and everyone eventually found the end destination at Edith's "HESSTOURANTA" which of course, need I say, stands for hospitality, gourmet food, indulgence!

We were treated to home-made ravioli with chicken and cream sauce, and salad, with hazelnut mousse for dessert. A nice way to round off a lovely exciting day!
