Vor 51 Jahren erfand der damalige Student Robert Barth Rivella. "Spuren der Zeit" zeigt sein Portrat.

Jedes Schweizer Kind kennt Rivella. Im "Spuren der Zeit" -Beitrag "Der Patron" erzählt Reto Holzgang die Geschichte der Limonade - und ihres Erfinders Robert Barth.

Ende der Vierzigerjahre traunte der junge Zurcher Jus-Student davon, etwas Eigenes zu erschaffen. Als er per Zufall ein Rezept in die Hande bekam, das beschrieb, wie man aus Molke, dem Abfallprodukt aus der Kaseherstellung, Bier oder Limonade machen kann, sah Robert Barth seine grosse Stunde gekommen. Im Keller seines Elternhauses experimentierte er herum, bis er ein Getrank zusammengebraut hatte, "das den Gaumen des Weintrinkers nicht beleidigt". Spba;d der 29-Jahrige von seiner Kreation überzeugt war, gründete er eine Firma und brachte 1952 Rivella auf den Markt.

Heute ist Robert Barth 80. Und blickt auf ein innovatives Arbeitsleben zurück: Nach dem klassischen Rivella rot hat er 1958 mit dem Rivella blau das erste kunstlich gesusste Light-Getrank Europas auf den Markt gebracht.

In Reto Holzgangs Film gibt sich "Der Patron" aber auch selbstkritisch und versucht zu erklären, weshalb Rivella ein schweizerisches Getrank blieb und im Ausland nie richtige reussierte.

Angry Monk: Reflections on Tibet

Largely ignored or reviled in his lifetime, Gendun Choephel (1903-1951) has become an important figure in a rapidly changing Tibet. Choephel was angry; he was also a passionate sensualist (he smoked, drank and translated the Kama Sutra into Tibetan) and tragically ahead of his time: all of which did little to endear him to the Tibetan government. A man of impressive wit and intelligence, he lived almost 30 years as a monk, and left disillusioned, but determined to see what else the world had to offer. Director Luc Schaedler retraces Choephel's travels across India and Tibet and retells his story as personal odyssey and symbol of Tibet's wavering responses to China and to modernisation.

"The myth of Tibet as peaceable kingdom destroyed by Chinese occupation was an idea that Choephel himself exposed with his research into Tibet's warring past. Religious fundamentalism, be it Catholic doctrine or Buddhist philosophy, is the same the world over, and a culture that stops is a culture that rots.
