"We in Switzerland have a real poverty problem"

In an interview with swissinfo, Hugo Fasel, director of the Catholic church charity Caritas, said more than a quarter of a million Swiss children lived below the poverty line and that education was key to winning the fight.

A three-prong political approach was appropriate: improve equality issues, work for better access to job training and the labour market, and fight poverty on the family level.

It's important that people get a job rather than simply slipping off the market. Every month, 2,000 people lose their unemployment benefits; then they end up on welfare.

For a long time, poverty was not a topic at all. People didn't want to talk about the fact that one in ten people in Switzerland is poor. Many people in Switzerland are ashamed to go on welfare. Fasel said that youths should be provided with apprenticeships rather than welfare so that they're not poor on account of a low income. Rather than giving families welfare because they have several children, the benefits per child should be increased so that they can get a good education rather than end up in poverty.

swissinfo
