Tip No. 1 Gallus Trail

Follow the foot steps of the Monk Gallus who, in 612, came from Arbon to St. Gallen, where he established his hermitage. The Gallus Trail begins at Arbon railway station, follows the shore of Lake Constance and subsequently leads to Steinach. At the chapel in Arbon, you can see the Gallus stone, which shows the footprints of Gallus. The route continues through the village of Steinach and then more or less along the River Steinach, through meadows and woodland up towards St. Gallen. Following the impressive section through the Galgentobel Valley, you reach the City of St. Gallen, or to be more precise, the district of Neudorf. From here, beautiful streets will take you to the heart of the city, to the start of the Mülenenschlucht Gorge where, following his fall into a thorn bush and encounter with a bear, Gallus founded his hermitage. There are many other wonderful walking tracks in and around St. Gallen, including that around the "Drei Weieren" (three ponds) and the Convent of Notkersegg (see picture above), this time following the foot steps of Nelly Steinemann (see page 4).

Tip No. 2 Beer Bottle Museum

The Schützengarten Brewery is the home of Switzerland's first beer bottle museum. Exhibits feature 2,000 bottles from 260 different breweries. The oldest examples are made of clay and are approximately 140 years old.

The exhibition is organised geographically and also provides a very impressive account of Swiss beer-brewing history.
