## CORRESPONDENCE.

To the Editor "The Swiss Observer."

Sir,—I notice in the last issue of the "S.O." that the Governments of the Cantons of Vaud and Uri have put a ban upon Sunday motor traffic between the hours of 1.30 and 6.30 p.m. It is obvious that the "Machthaber" of the two cantons in question are opposed to making concessions to the "Zeitgeist," but it would be interesting to know on what grounds these astounding edicts were issued. Was it from feelings of practical consideration for the preservation of the cantonal roads or due to commiseration with the hapless pedestrian, who, as often as not, is compelled—with many curses under bated breath!—to swallow the prodigious dust which usually rises in the wake of a passing motor-car on macadamized roads, or perhaps the "löbl. Regierungen" concerned imagine that they can most effectively ban this noxious traffic by forbidding it on Sunday afternoons, when, in the very nature of things, it is most pronounced?

Whatever the reason, it is difficult to understand the mentality of those who are responsible for this interdict, which is as futile a measure as it was ill-conceived. It will certainly neither hinder nor retard motor traffic, which will ever become more intense until replaced by some still more advanced form of locomotion, and can only result in doing our country, the tourist's land par excellence, whose very beauty attracts and invites motor tours, a great deal of harm, whilst incidentally rendering us the laughing stock of Europe. It is high time that the whole question affecting motor traffic in Switzerland came within the prerogative of the Federal Government at Berne, so as to enable the latter to deal with it in the spirit of the times we live in.
