Cinderella Dance at the Midland Grand Hotel, St. Pancras.

The 2nd Cinderella Dance of this season took place last Saturday (6th Dec.) at the Midland Grand Hotel, St. Pancras.

"Humour is the salt of life" is the motto of the Entertainment Committees, and the Swiss Mercantile Society has had the good fortune to secure for Mr. Chas. Strübin a president of this special "portfolio" who is well on the way to show its members and friends the great truth of this motto. Before speaking of the dance proper, I congratulate Mr. Strübin, in the name of about 180 participants, on the successful manner in which he organised it.

The rapidity with which the tickets were sold was an excellent indication that a large attendance was to be expected. Indeed, the number of 180 participants will be, if not *the* limit, at least close to the maximum attendance advisable in order to obviate an overcrowded condition during the dance, which would seriously interfere with its high spirit and pleasure. This rush is by no means astonishing, and confirms the view that the Cinderella Dances of the Swiss Mercantile Society are among the most popular entertainments in the Colony. Devoid of any atmosphere of 'stiffness' and free from formal speeches, these dances are able to produce the gaiety which helps the Swiss through London's winter, although without the attractions of the season at home.

The next dance (fancy dress) will take place on the 3rd of January next. Some nice surprises are undoubtedly in store, and early bookings are recommended. M. W. G.

Exhibition of Swiss Coloured Prints.

The Alpine Club arranged in its Galleries at 23, Savile Row (entrance Mill Street) for the month of December an Exhibition of Swiss Coloured Prints. In connection with the 'Cabinet des Estampes de l'Ecole Polytechnique' in Zurich and the 'Musée des Beaux-Arts' in Berne, as well as by the assistance of the Club's members and friends (here are to be mentioned our Minister and Madame C. R. Paravicini) a very interesting and carefully selected collection of over 200 of the best and most typical prints have been gathered.

The exhibits are of the period between 1770 and 1820, and represent masterly works by Aberli, Freudenberger, Koenig, Lory, Sprunglin, and other famous painters of this time. As works of art most of them show a very delicate perception, e.g., the lovely 'Jungfrau,' by Aberli, and several scenes of family life, by Koenig. Also as prints, both in outlines and in colours, they are very well reproduced.

There are as subjects splendid bright landscapes and ice-clad mountains, and a great number of old costumes from all parts of Switzerland, and very nice and intimate scenes of Swiss alpine life.

In view of the beauty of our country, as well as its absorbing interest in historical, in artistic, and in technical respects, the visitor will find many attractions, and, after all, the pictures will delight everyone in these days of hustle by the sunshine and peace of the 'good old time.' The Exhibition, open from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m., admission free, can be heartily recommended to every fellow-countryman.

SWISS BANK FOOTBALL CLUB.

(Unavoidably held over from last week.)

FIRST ELEVEN.

The Bank qualified for the 4th round of the A.F.A. Minor Cup on Saturday, Nov. 29th, by winning the replay against Trinity F.C. to the tune of 4 goals to nil.

The Swiss forward line on this occasion had been re-arranged, Tobler and Way filling the outside-right and inside-left positions respectively, with Goubach in the centre. Quaife immediately on his right, and Holton on the extreme left. Bornaand was unfit (and unfortunately still is), whilst Schwendener filled the vacancy created at right full-back by Herzog's departure for Switzerland.

This re-arrangement proved itself effective, and the Bank had no difficulty in establishing their superiority over Trinity. The first goal came from Glaser's boot, an unexpected drive from some distance out being successful. Quaife (2) and Holton (1) completed the total.

The team worked well and with something of its old-time form. No special praise can be given to any particular player, with the possible exception of Schwendener, who occupied his new position with great success. He played well up the field, tackled cleanly and cleared with fine first-time efforts, which were not, at the same time, too strong to be of no use to the forwards. His speed showed up very much, but a tendency to dribble in the later stages of the game was noticeable. His success is worth special mention, since he was taken at short notice from the inside-right position—something vastly different from full-back.

A notable absentee from the team was Herzog, who has left England for Switzerland. His departure is keenly regretted, as was witnessed by the many tokens of appreciation which came from his colleagues.

The Bank's opponents in the 4th round are the Great Northern Rly. The game will be played at Gordon Hill on Saturday, Dec. 13th.

The Bank beat Ludgate Circus 11 on Dec. 6th by one goal to nil. Thus they have still to be vanquished. The record now stands: Games played, 12; won, 10; drawn, 2.
