NOUVELLE SOCIETE HELVETIQUE.
GROUPE LONDONIEN.

The June Council Meeting of the London Group of the N.S.H. was held at the Secretariat, 28, Red Lion Square, on Wednesday, the 17th.

The Treasurer, Mr. A. F. Suter, gave quite a satisfactory report this month, though there are still fifteen subscriptions outstanding for 1924. He also outlined his financial policy for the future, and this received the entire support and approbation of the meeting.

The President, Mr. J. Baer, then read Circular No. 55 of the S.S.E. which had just reached the Secretariat, along with miscellaneous pamphlets and printed matter, which were also brought to the notice of the Councillors. Referring to a paragraph in the Circular, in which the S.S.E. asks the Groups Abroad to keep them in touch with their activities, Mr. Baer informed the meeting that the London Group sent a report each month to Fribourg, as well as a copy of its Annual Report. With regard to the paragraph announcing the arrival of copies of the special number of the "Berner Tagblatt," it was the opinion of the Council that it would be well for the S.S.E. to consult us in advance before sending quite so many copies of any publication as had now reached us of the "Berner Tagblatt." We would be pleased, of course, to see one or two numbers in our Reading Room for the benefit of members, but we had received at least a hundred copies of the "Berner Tagblatt," and it was a little difficult to know what to do with them all. It was felt by the meeting that we could not create a precedent by making propaganda for any one paper by distributing copies amongst our members, as, once that sort of thing was started, one never knew where it might end. Finally, it was agreed that we should send a sample copy of the "Berner Tagblatt" to one or two London Swiss Societies which have reading rooms, letting them know that we would be glad to give them more copies for their members should we want them.

There was some discussion over appeals for financial help which we had received from the Swiss Sports Committee for the "Georges Dimier Fund," and from the Swiss Gymnastic Society in order to enable them to send a gymnastic team to compete at the Federal Contests which will take place next month at Geneva. The Councillors were quite unanimous in agreeing that, in view of our present financial straits, it was quite impossible for us to subscribe to any appeals as a Society, however deserving they might be, and however willing we might be in principle to support them. At present it took all our resources to support ourselves, and in such circumstances, as one Councillor remarked, charity must begin at home. It was, however, agreed, that both these appeals should be kept at the Secretariat, and that the attention of any visitors to the office should be drawn to them. In this way, perhaps, it might be possible to collect a small amount of money for each of them.

Mr. Suter read the admirable letter he had sent to Dr. Lätt in reply to the one we had received from him for our consideration at our last meeting, and, as a result of this, there was again some discussion with regard to honouring the Swiss flag, and it was decided that we should write to the S.S.E. and ask them what had resulted from the discussions which had been held on this subject some years ago amongst the Groups Abroad.

Attention was drawn to a propaganda leaflet, recently received by the Secretariat and compiled in such bad English that it was felt we should write to the Bureau officiel des Expositions and draw their attention to the fact that our Secretariat would always be glad to put itself at their disposal in order to help them to make their propaganda readable and attractive to English people.
