COUNTER-REFORMATION.

Sir,—Under the heading "Counter-reformation" in your issue of July 18th a most interesting event is recorded. It would appear that there recently took place in the city of Berne, for the first time since the Protestant Reformation, a procession of the Blessed Sacrament, and that over 2,000 people, including the President and the Foreign Minister of the Swiss Confederation, took part in it.

Had you contented yourself with that, all would have been well, and all your Catholic readers, and most of your non-Catholic readers, would have been quite happy to learn of this unique event.

You, however, allow the sting of bigotry and the flush of malice to besmear your fair columns, and against this I protest.

Your correspondent asks: "Why on earth do Catholics wish to have processions?" and then immediately proceeds to answer his own question,

but attributing an unworthy motive; he says: "If it is not to advertise their faith?" Now, Sir, had he gone to the local priest, he would have been told that Catholics have processions:—

- (1) To express their gratitude to God;
(2) To beseech God's mercy;
(3) To do honour to God, or to the living, or to the dead.

Your correspondent must be aware of the fact that all peoples, in all ages, in all climes, and in all times, have formed themselves into processional order to carry out, one or other, or all of these. Would he consider that those who follow the remains of a dearly loved one to the cemetery are so doing to advertise the undertaker? Has he no respect for the religious expressions of his fellow-men? He goes on to say: "Protestants do not carry out processions," and he must know that such a statement is not only absurd, but is not true. He is so blinded by bigotry that he can see no good in the actions of any but himself. He very probably thinks himself a most broad-minded man, yet I do not hesitate to state that his outlook is narrow and his prejudice is colossal.

You would do well to carefully censor his writings to your journal in the future, for he has not taken the trouble to find out the reason for things in this instance, and he has given us his own petty and personal views, which impress nobody, but irritate many, especially,
