Re ADULA ALPINE HUT.

Sir,—With reference to what appeared in the S.O. last year about the Adula Mountain chain (Piz Walrhain) and its beautiful hut, built by the S.A.C. Sezione Ticinese, intending visitors to Switzerland will be pleased to note that photographs and other views of this picturesque district will be on view in the show windows of the Swiss Federal Railways, 11b, Regent Street, S.W.1, from Monday next for a limited time.

I may repeat that the panorama and views enjoyed from this particular cabane are simply splendid. The newly-constructed hut is considered the best of its kind in the Swiss Alps and offers sleeping accommodation to 35 tourists, an English-speaking caretaker being always in attendance. It can be reached from Olivone at the foot of the Greina Pass and the Lukmanier in the Val Blenio,

or from Dangio via Val Soja, also in the Blenio. Olivone, a large village on an extensive plain, offers itself as an admirable base for a series of romantic excursions. Yours truly, G. Cust.

* Der Berner Verein für Verbreitung guter Schriften bringt in seiner Nr. 141 (Juni 1926) die gemüt- und humorvolle Erzählung "Mozart auf der Reise nach Prag" von Eduard Mörike, die uns einen tiefen Einblick in das innere und äussere Leben des lebenswürdigen Tondichters tun lässt.

Ein Reiseerlebnis, das zuerst grossen Verdross bereitet, wird zur Quelle der höchsten Freude. Der zerstreute Tondichter pflichtet, ganz in Gedanken an ein Jugenderlebnis versunken, im Parke des Grafen Schinzberg eine Pomeranze. Der Gärtner meldet den vermeintlichen Diebstahl seiner Herrschaft, die von der zufälligen Gegenwart des berühmten Musikers hochbeglückt ist und ihm mit seiner Gattin in das Schloss einladet, wo gerade die Nichte des Grafen, eine begeisterte Mozartverehrerin, ihre Verlobung feiert. Die Gesellschaft verlebt mit dem unterhaltenden Musiker und seiner lebenswürdigen Gattin einen herrlichen Tag. Am andern Morgen schenkt ihm der Graf einen bequemen Reisewagen. Aber die heitere Erzählung schliesst mit einer wehmütigen Ahnung von dem frühen Tode des Meisters, verursacht durch seine aufreibende Lebensweise, von der seine Gattin ein anschauliches Bild gibt. Möchte dieses Meisterwerk den Dichter und den Komponisten unsern Lesern menschlich näher bringen!
