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In John Knittel's hands the *crime passionnel* and the murder trial are not sensational, but deeply gripping. And from the psychological point of view, the last scene of the book is the best of all, for here we have a glimpse of this couple, in whose souls such tempests have raged, left calm and blank and empty, like the white sky after the passing of the dark storm clouds.

It is a truly remarkable novel, and in spite of the fact that the English language still comes with a certain difficulty from the author's pen, the London Press have united in acclaiming it. The *Daily Telegraph*, indeed, predict that he will be of that select band who chose English as their language, and whose head, of course, is Conrad. The *Sunday Times* and the *Daily Express* both compare it with Hardy's masterpiece "Tess of the d'Urbervilles." And after that, the volume of lesser expressions of praise may remain unquoted. No one can say whether this work of art will survive the contemporary flood of fiction in this country, but in Switzerland itself the book will live, at any rate, in its German translation.

GOLF.

We are now in a position to give further details about this competition, which will be run on the following lines:—

Owing to the fact that it would be extremely difficult, if not impossible, to arrange that all the competitors should play on the same day and on the same course, it has been decided that to get over this difficulty partners who have been drawn together can arrange their own place and time. Out of the four rounds of eighteen holes, two rounds may be played on the course wherever the competitor is a member. Partners can therefore arrange between themselves where to play. The scores must be returned on the official cards of the course on which the rounds are played, and the full handicap will be deducted from the gross score and compared with "bogey" of that particular course.

Two rounds of eighteen holes each must be played away from the competitor's own club. The competition is therefore in the nature of a stroke competition against "bogey." Local rules shall in each case govern the play. Each competitor's handicap and the name of his Club should be forwarded with entry. It is hoped that everybody interested will do their best to swell the number of competitors. Entries must be received within fourteen days.
