SWISS CHORAL SOCIETY.

The Annual Banquet and Ball of the Swiss Choral Society was held last Friday (Feb. 24th) at the First Avenue Hotel, W.C., Monsieur W. R. de Bourg, First Secretary of Legation, being in the chair. About 150 members and friends sat down to an excellent dinner served with care and dispatch, and after the two traditional toasts had been submitted and duly honoured,

Monsieur de Bourg rose to express his gratification at again being privileged to preside over that gathering. His chief, the Swiss Minister, was still in Egypt and he had hopes that he (the Minister) would bring back from his visit and inspection of the tomb of Tutankhamen some papyri recording ancient and so far unknown songs and melodies which no doubt he would present to the Swiss Choral Society for modern revival. Mr. de Bourg complimented the Committee of the Society on their untiring efforts and the evident success obtained in keeping alive in our Colony the interest in our national songs.

Mr. J. Manzoni, the President, in proposing the further prosperity of his Society, was delighted to welcome once more in the Chair their old friend, Monsieur de Bourg, who was accompanied by Mr. Hilfiker, the Chancellor of the Legation. He was glad to hear that the work of his Society was appreciated in official quarters, but he felt bound to tell them that the financial side did not present the pleasant picture to which they were entitled. He would only refer to the last charity concert which they had organised in conjunction with the Swiss Institute and the proceeds of which were earmarked for the Swiss Benevolent Society. The financial result was in no way commensurate with the strenuous work and personal sacrifice on the part of the members during the rehearsals which preceded it. He thought financial failure was in a large measure due to causes which could easily be remedied, and it seemed to him incumbent on the other Societies in the Colony to show their active sympathy and co-operation by refraining from holding dances or other social events on or near the date for which the Charity Concert was advertised. He had no complaint to make with regard to their contributing members, whose support continued to be most encouraging; they would be pleased to hear that they had succeeded in securing the services of Mr. W. Meyrowitz, who would be the new conductor of the choir and under whose experienced leadership they looked forward to a very successful future.

Mr. John Gerber proposed the health of "The Ladies." His heart, he said, stood still at the sight of the wonderful array in front of him; however, he was speaking on behalf of the gentlemen present and, like a loud-speaker, it was his duty to broadcast the sensitive waves and vibrations which the presence of the ladies always gave rise to. He had some misgivings as to holding this banquet on a Friday, but was now convinced that the Swiss Choral Society exercised a greater power of attraction than Amami night!

SWISS GYMNASIC SOCIETY.

What was probably the best Display ever presented by the above Society since the Amalgamation at the commencement of 1925, took place last Sunday afternoon at the Union Helvetia Club, in aid of the Lucerne Fund to enable a team to compete in July next at the forthcoming Federal Gymnastic Festival. Individual work by both the Junior and the Active Member sections at the horizontal bar started the ball rolling and some beautifully executed exercises were seen. The Juniors, who worked for the first time on this apparatus, showed pronounced promise, especially in view of the fact that apparatus work in the schools in this country is practically an unknown quantity. Mr. O'Brien gave as good an Indian Club Swinging exhibition as one wishes to see, and the Seniors' high grade drill exercise with "Standwegen" and head stands succeeded admirably. The second part of the programme beginning with the parallel bars, proved quickly and clearly that this apparatus is the strong point of the gymnasts and that special and intensive training had been done. What impressed spectators particularly was the smart, well nigh perfect, execution of the exercises; style and deportment being specially polished. It transpired later on that this is the apparatus on which the Society's team intends to work in Lucerne, and prospects are very good indeed. Then followed the drill exercise of the juniors, which could scarcely be lettered. Indeed, they set their seniors a fine example as to how a body of men should work together, the harmony of the movements being exactly what it should be in drill exercises. It is to be hoped that the Society will see its way to let these juniors compete at the Team Drill Championships of England in December next, where they should render a fine account of themselves. An exhibition of Swiss Wrestling was preceded by an acrobatic turn by Messrs. Pieters, Jaquenoud and Thivent which would have been quite a good turn on any Music Hall stage, and these gymnasts are to be congratulated on their entertaining performance. The display ended with a fine exhibition of pyramids by the juniors and seniors. The former's handstands on the knees was indeed a surprising feat for such youngsters, and their work was generously applauded by the fairly large audience. The seniors' pyramids on the parallel bars were excellent, and succeeded admirably without any untoward incident. The leader, Mr. Schneeberger, and the gymnasts are to be heartily congratulated on their fine work, while the greatest praise is due to the youngsters for their truly remarkable performance. In the evening the customary Dance, with a further acrobatic interlude, concluded a most successful day for the Swiss Gymnastic Society. Every lover of Gymnastics will hope that the Swiss Colony will support the Gymnasts financially to enable them to compete in Lucerne, because their work deserves recognition.
