Il Ticino è e deve restar Svizzero, ad ogni costo.

Elvezia tu sei la nostra Patria, e la nostra affezione rimarrà incorruttibile.

Chiudo pertanto, bene augurando alla prosperità della Patria lontana, all'opera fattiva delle sue Autorità, e perchè i buoni rapporti fra Confederazione e Cantone abbiano sempre più a rinsaldarsi e diventar migliori.

Amiamo la nostra Patria come una seconda Madre.

AARGAU.

GRAUBUENDEN.

The oldest female inhabitant of the Bregaglia has died at Castasegna in the person of widow Maria Maffei-Maffei. She was a peasant woman and reached the respectable age of 98 years and 7 months; until her death she had never been known to have been ill. St. G.T.

A serious car accident occurred on the Engadine side of the Julierpass. A Leipzig manufacturer, accompanied by his two daughters and a chauffeur, drove his car up the pass at a slow pace. He stopped in one of the bends of the road to let a car coming from the opposite direction pass, when suddenly his own car started rolling backwards. It left the road and rolled down the mountain side. The owner was killed outright: his two daughters are severely injured. The chauffeur alone escaped with slight injuries. Fortunately the car, which had passed them, had a doctor among the passengers. He rendered first aid and had the injured removed to Silvaplana. N.Z.Z.

GENEVA.

An arrangement has been concluded between three leading Geneva banks—the Union Financière de Genève, the Comptoir d'Escompte de Genève and the Banque de Dépôts et de Crédit—to establish close co-operation. Each bank will retain its identity, but there will be an interchange of directors, and the institutions will co-operate in financial transactions of importance. As the Union Financière de Genève and the Banque de Dépôts et de Crédit are controlled by a number of Geneva private banking firms, their co-operation with the Comptoir d'Escompte de Genève results in a significant pooling of banking resources of that centre. The capital of the Comptoir d'Escompte is 60,000,000 frs., that of the Union Financière is 50,000,000 frs. and that of the Banque de Dépôts 15,000,000.

The arrangement has aroused considerable interest in Swiss banking circles, as it is believed to foreshadow an amalgamation of the three banks. The Union Financière is in the first place a financial house, while the two other banks are mainly commercial banks, though they are also engaged in issuing transactions. It is believed that for the present their co-operation will confine itself to the flotation of new issues in the Western Swiss market, where they have gained a predominant position. B.F.

LAUSANNE.

Ernest Udet, the most famous of Germany's war airmen, is assisting Dr. Franck and M. Suschati in shooting scenes in Switzerland for "Les étoiles du Mont Blanc." After passing over Lausanne, where he has established his headquarters, he recently made an investigation flight around and over Mont Blanc at a height of 4,500 metres. He has obtained permission to fly between the two towers of the Lausanne Cathedral, and his programme also includes the Lake of Geneva and Chillon castle. C.
