All our societies and clubs suffer from the same ailment—the impossibility of replacing the inevitable "déchêts" by fresh blood. I now gather from an advertisement in the same issue that a well-known Swiss centre, frequented and supported by more compatriots than any other Swiss institution in the Colony, is likely to pass into other hands. The existance of the building in question is due to the enthusiasm and practical patriotism of—I may justly say—the last generation. Have we lost all appreciation of the ideal side of life?

I am not in a position to suggest remedies, but I believe that the friendly competition between the clubs and the assurances of existing cordial relations so studiously repeated at the annual banquets should give way to a more liberal measure or real and constructive co-operation.

Forwarding of Messages by Telegraph and Telephone through the Train Staff of the Swiss Federal Railways:—The staff of the Swiss Federal Railways on all trains take messages for forwarding by telegraph or telephone. The message for communication should be written on a slip of paper with the exact address or telephone number, and should be handed to the attendant on the train, who will pass on the message at the next stop. For telegrams the ordinary charges are payable together with a charge of 60 Cts. For messages by telephone, the charge is Fr. 1.50 up to 15 words in Switzerland. This innovation is being extensively utilized by the travelling public.
