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It is a rare delight for the traveller, who treads his ways in the hurly-burly of modern science, industry and commerce, to escape and have communion among the mountains with minds so utterly at one with Nature in all her moods. The lure of the Alps is so strong that it detaches the traveller from his world. Complete estrangement is the richest holiday, a rejuvenation in which the mind is refreshed and the body reinvigorated.

A Swiss Passion Play.

Switzerland has also produced stirring theatrical presentations. The Passion Play of Oberammergau, across the border in Bavaria, though more famous, is a not higher artistic production than that at Selzach, near Berne. This play is being presented this year in all the wonder of its natural setting among the mountains. It is a peasant Passion play in which all the inhabitants of Selzach play their part.

At Interlaken too, is being repeated Schiller's masterpiece William Tell. The original medieval castle is the centrepiece of the mise-en-scene. Behind, the Jungfrau group tower to the amphitheatre of the skies. Before the castle beside a lake, lies a greensward, and out from the forests which surround it the players defile, horsed and on foot, gaily caparisoned, with great crowds of peasants in historic costume accompanied by the pick of the Alpine herds swinging their melodious ancient bells. The spectators, under cover, feel part of the drama. They see in the play the same forms and characters as they meet in their relations with the people, the hardy originals of a peasant stock, yet among the most highly cultured people in Europe.

As a world traveller I am by Switzerland drawn back time after time. There is something curiously fascinating in a land and a people who, in the centre of a European turmoil, although possessed of electrified railways, the greatest power stations in the world and every modern comfort, yet retain a heroic and spiritual unity with the unmatched beauties of their countryside.

J'espère que je me trompe dans mon jugement, mais je suis sûr que beaucoup de vieux gymnastes qui ont assistés aux fêtes fédérales précédentes ont emporté de la fête d'Aarau un regret des temps passés lorsque ces fêtes étaient faites pour le plaisir et le couronnement du travail de notre belle et forte jeunesse et non, je le crains, pour des entreprises commerciales.
