There are some very beautiful scenes at Biarritz and in the Basque country. The final scene with the death of Golder takes place on a boat on the Black sea, in a fog and is a remarkable example of technique.

The part of David Golder is played by Harry Baur, and is really a wonderfully performance. A film to be seen. *ck.*
