craft — 2 Lockheed *Orions*, 7 three-engined Fokker F. VIII, 1 single-engined Fokker F.VIIa, 1 single-engined Messerschmitt M.18d. and 1 single-engined Comte A.C.4. These machines are operated from May 1st to October 31st and are laid up and overhauled during the winter months.

A system is in force whereby the external air lines of Switzerland are operated as a pool with foreign operating companies. The total number of passengers carried on all Swiss air lines, including these foreign air lines, was 28,441 in 1932, as against 22,366 in the preceding year. Mails, freight and luggage at 619 tons showed a decrease on the 1931 figure, which was 688 tons.

"Swissair" have found it possible to reduce each year the net cost per flown mile of their aircraft. In 1931 it was 3s. 7d. per mile for their three-engined aircraft. In 1932 the figure dropped to 3s. 5½d. and in 1933 it is anticipated that the cost will be reduced to 2s. 8d. per mile except for the Alpine lines, which will cost 2s. 9½d.

The Company's total income of £78,733 during 1932 was made up as to 38 per cent. of direct subsidy, 26.5 per cent. of revenue from mails, 23.5 per cent. of revenue from passengers and freight, and 12 per cent. from miscellaneous sources. This is a low percentage of subsidy for a Continental system, but is accounted for by the fact that a large part of the mail revenue is really indirect subsidy. This indirect subsidy is gradually being scaled down by the Swiss Post Office.

#### A CLOCK WONDER OF THE WORLD.

##### Messina's New Show.

The clock constructed by the Swiss expert Ungerer for the new Campanile of Messina, which has now been publicly inaugurated and blessed, can claim to rank as a new wonder of the world.

The first Campanile of Messina was erected in 1197 by order of the Emperor-King Henry IV, at the time the Cathedral was dedicated. The building was begun in the time of King Roger of Sicily. Since then the Campanile was destroyed and rebuilt seven times. Twice it was destroyed by lightning, and five times by earthquakes.

When Ungerer set the clock in motion, the hands suddenly pointed to six o'clock, and, under the clock, facing the principal square, the majestic figure of a lion began to raise its head, shake its mane, swish its tail, and open its mouth to let out three tremendous roars. With the right paw it raised the staff with the arms of the city until they appeared high over the clock. A magnificent cock then appeared fluttered its wings, craned its neck and burst out in song.

This was followed by the procession of the legendary heavenly messengers. According to a very ancient tradition, the Holy Virgin sent a letter, through St. Paul, to the city of Messina, promising her special protection. The Apostle suddenly appears descending from heaven with an angel and delivers his message. He is followed by a number of heavenly figures supposed to have formed his suite as the Ambassador of the Holy Virgin.

After the scene of the message, a dove, representing the Holy Ghost, appears in the oval window and moves in the entire semi-circle. Finally a mountain appears with a church on the summit, representing the shrine of Montalto, to which many legends are attached, and which it is supposed preceded the Cathedral of Messina.

On the right and left sides of the Campanile the clock represents the phases of the moon in their exact rotation throughout the year, and the entire planetary system with the nine planets revolving around the sun, and giving also the entire Gregorian Calendar of the year.

The clock with its mechanism is a continual wonder, and affords an object of study every hour of the day.

#### AS SHE IS SPOKE.

A Birmingham man, just back from the Continent, quotes some quaint examples of foreign liberties with our mother tongue by hotel keepers.

In a window of a Swiss hotel appears the following: "Spacious rooms. Best beds. Here we cook the English every day. French cooked on Sundays and Fridays, otherwise not, unless special intention is ordered. Dogs must not be without special leave of the propriety herein brought. Carriages to hire, horses to ride, or asses equal to the company herein visiting."

Another hotel advertisement is: "The visitor may enjoy sport, seeing the races, the course of foot, the course of gallop, drive of trot and drive or course of trot." In another hotel the following doleful announcement appears: "The groans of the waiters are obliged to be made to the bureau."

Our Birmingham friend, who, by the way, was a much-married man, was greatly amused by this notice on the wall of his bedroom: "Strange gentlemen will to please not to dress for dinner, etc., as this costume flutters the souls of the maid-folk and no work is resulted. Humbly asked." *Birmingham Post.*
