FEDERAL.

SWITZERLAND AND THE ECONOMIC CONFERENCE.

The Federal Council has now chosen the dele gates for the World Economic Conference which will start on the 12th inst. in London.

They are: Dr. Schulthess, President of the Swiss Confederation, as head of the delegation; M. Stucki, Ministry of Commerce; Professor Bachmann, President of the Board of the National Bank; Professor Dr. Laur; Dr. Sarasin, National Bank; Professor Dr. Laur; Dr. Sarasin, National Bank; Dr. Dapples, General Manager of Nestlé's; National Councillor Dr. Wetter. The delegation will be accompanied by the following experts and substitutes: Dr. Bindschedler, Swiss delegate on the German Debt. Committee, M. Golay, General Manager Swiss Bank Corporation, Dr. Homberger of the "Schweiz. Handels und Industrieverein" M. Jaberg, Bank Manager, Zurich; State Councillor Porchet, Lausanne.

At a meeting which took place between the Federal Council and the delegates it was decided that Switzerland should remain on the gold standard and should adhere to the tariff truce.

One of the outstanding performances of the day was the splendid achievement of Mr. A. Matter, Swiss Mcreantile Society, who performed Matter, Swiss, Acreantile Society, who performed the "hat-trick" by winning three first prizes (Putting the Weight, High Jump, Long Jump). A. Matter in the Putting the Weight event has beaten all previous records obtained at the Swiss Sports (36ft. lin.), in the High Jump he eclipsed the record for the Swiss Sports by no less than three inches, and amidst hearty cheering cleared 5ft. Sins.

The "George Dimier Challenge Cup" for scoring the highest aggregate number of points, which was wen cutright by the S.M.S. last year, and replaced this year by Mme. George Dimier, was awarded to the Swiss Mercantile Society.

Such fancy events as the "Cigarette Race," Egg-and-Spoon" Race," "Blindfold Race," and "Three-Legged Race," could unfortunately not be held owing to weather conditions, which was a great pity as these popular events usually give much cause for merriment.
