NEW SWISS MINISTER TO JAPAN. The Swiss Government has appointed Mon-sieur Walter Thurnheer, at present General Con-sul at Montreal to the post of Swiss Minister at Tokio, in succession to Monsieur Traversini who has vacated his post. The new Minister hails from Berneck. (St. Gall).

SWISS CLAIM TO WAR DAMAGES.

SWISS CLAIM TO WAR DAMAGES. The Secretary-General of the League has been notified that the Swiss Federal Council has decided to bring before the Council of the League a dispute which has arisen between the Swiss Government on the one hand and Germany, the British Empire, France, and Italy on the other on the subject of compensation for damages suffered by Swiss citizens on the territories of these Powers during the Great War. The matter

It has now been decided to take energetic measures for the reorganization and financial reconstruction of the Swiss Federal Railways. reconstruction of the Swiss Federal Railways. A Bill and an emergency decree have been sub-mitted for the approval of the Board of Admin-istration of the Railways, and it is hoped that these will be ready for consideration by Parlia-ment in the autumn. Meanwhile, by virtue of the emergency decree the Federal Council will be empowered to order any simplification it may consider necessary in the organization of the railway administration, as also to authorize the railways to transport both persons and goods by means of motor vehicles and to fill vacancies in their services by persons taken from outside the ranks of Government officials. SWISS BAN ON GERMAN NEWSPAPERS. The Swiss Government have decided to pro-long indefinitely the ban on three German news-papers, the Völkischer Beobachter, the Börsen-Zeitung, and the Angriff, as a reprisal for the German ban on the three leading Swiss news-papers, the National Zeitung, the Neue Zürcher Zeitung and the Bund.

THE BASLE TRADING COMPANY.

THE BASLE TRADING COMPANY. In the House of Lords recently Viscount Templetown again drew attention to the claim of the Basle Trading Co. against the Government of India, and suggested that two impartial persons should be asked to advise on it. The suggestion was rejected on the ground that the Secretary of State and the Indian Government consider that the offer made to the company was a fair one — in other words, that their own judgment in a case against them should be conclusive. In the pre-cisely similar matter of the war-time confiscation of this Swiss company's properties on the Gold Coast the Colonial Secretary took a different course. He songht advice, and finding that a wrong had been done remedied it by restoring the properties and paying compensation to the amount properties and paying compensation to the amount

properties and paying compensation to the amount of £250,000. The confiscation of the properties in India was equally contrary to the principles of inter-national law, and the settlement that has been proposed is on terms which the Swiss claimants rightly regard as inadequate and inequitable. Being doubtless anxious to believe that the Indian Government would not paying it is refused to Being doubtless anxious to believe that the Indian Government would not persist in its refusal to do justice the Swiss Government has not hitherto intervened. Presumably, however, it will now make representations on behalf of its aggrieved nationals, and in that event it will be found im-possible to justify the conduct of the Indian Government.

The Pope has appointed Cardinal Schuster, Archbishop of Milan, as Papal Legate for the forthcoming Millenary Festivities at the Bene-dictine monastery at Maria Einsiedeln. The Papal Brief appointing Cardinal Schuster, him-self a Benedictine of Swiss origin, pays a high tribute to the splendid work accomplished by the monks of Einsiedeln, throughout the centuries, ad majorem Dei gloriam and as faithful custo-dians of the famous shrine of "Our Lady in the dark forest." dark forest.

WORLD CONGRESS ON ALCOHOLISM

The Federal Council has appointed M. C. R. Paravicini, Swiss Minister in London, and Dr. Oettli, in Lausanne to be the Swiss Delegates at the 20th World Congress on Alcoholism which will take place in London shortly.

SWISS EMIGRATION.

SWISS EMIGRATION. During 1933, a total of 1167 against 1301 in 1932, Swiss left Switzerland to settle down in overseas countries. Amongst these emigrants 352 went to Africa, 334 to America, 210 to Asia, 140 to South America. The canton of Zurich pro-duced the biggest contingent (221), then follows the canton of Geneva with 186; the cantons of Vaud 150; Basle 139 and Berne 120. During the last few years the emigration of Swiss citizens has continiously declined, whilst the immigration has substantially increased. has substantially increased.

TIR FEDERAL.

The costs for erecting the shooting accommo-in Fribourg for the Tir Fédéral amount to over half a million france. Over 40,000 marksmen are expected to visit Fribourg during the three weeks. Altogether 1665 clubs, with a member-ship of over 40,000 are booked to shoot, this figure will be increased by about 10%, through marksmen who do not belong to a shooting association.

SAAR PLEBISCITE.

Dr. Luescher (Switzerland) has been ap-pointed controller of the electoral office of Saarlouis, which is one of those established throughout the Saar to organise the distribution of electoral cards and supervise the plebiscite of January 13th, 1935.

NAZI BOAT IN SWISS WATER.

The Swiss Government may send a protest to the German Government in connection with the Swiss sciaure of a German monor-boat carrying explosives for Nazi terrorist activities in Austria in Swiss territorial waters in Lake Constance recently. Three members of the Nazi Austrian legion from Lindau, Bavaria, were arrested on here. her.

her. M. Baumann, the Minister of Justice, gave full details of the seizure of this boat to the Cabinet at a meeting. He confirmed that the boat had been seized with explosives in it and that it belonged to a Storm Troop leader. He also said that this boat had made several journeys across Lake Constance, infringing Swiss territory and probably carrying contraband, and that this had drawn the suspicions of the police.

THE "EIDGENOESSISCHE SCHUETZENFAHNE" AT FRIBOURG.

The "Eidgenössische Schützenfahne" arrived The "Edgenossische Schutzentanne" arrived at Fribourg on Saturday last from Bellinzona. The Government of the Canton of Fribourg was present *in globo*, as well as a large number of spectators.

LOCAL.

BERNE. From Berne comes the news of the death of M. Ulrich Amstutz at the age of 55; he was a well known Sports reporter and also a gifted fiction writer.

LUCEBNE.

The 4% Loan of 8 million francs of the canton of Lucerne has been heavily over subscribed.

The Spar and Leihkasse Entlebuch has had an official receiver appointed, as far as can be ascertained at present, the deposits are secured.

ZUG.

A "Yodling" competition will take place at Zug on August 5th, altogether 18 Yodelklubs are expected to compete.

BASLE.

Dr. K. Joêl, Professor of Philosophy at the University of Basic has died at the age or 70. Professor Joêl was the author of a great number works on philosophical subjects and enjoyed an intermiting working and a subjects and enjoyed an international reputation.

Dr. Emile Howald, chief teacher of commercial subjects at the Swiss Mercantile school in Basle has died at the age of 33.

APPENZELL-a.Rn. Dr. II. K. Sonderegger, the candidate of the "Freiwirtschaftsbundes" was elected member of the States Council (Ständerat) with 4,828 votes, his opponent Dr. Altherr (Liberal) received 4133 votes. The new member of Parliament is a mem-ber of the "Kantonsrat" and comes from Heiden.

GENEVA.

During a heavy storm which broke out over the town of Geneva, an overhead tram wire was struck by lightning. The flash travelled down to a tram full of passengers, which for an apprecia-ble time was enveloped in spurting blue flame, while from within could be heard the shrieks of the passengers, who had an extraordinary escape from being burned alive.

TICINO.

TICINO. Violent thunderstorms accompanied by torrential rains and hail of almost unprecedented intensity raged throughout the canton of Ticino during the last week-end causing enormous damage to crops. The losses to the vine and the tobacco plantations in the valleys have been especially severe. The hailstones, which in places were swept by high winds into drifts three feet deen, have, it is feared, brought ruin to many of
