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The programme of other important races is very big. The Swiss "Langlauf" over 50 kilometres and the National Relay Ski Race will be held at Kandersteg (March 2nd-3rd) and the *Fis* Races — Downhill and Slalom — are fixed for Mürren (February 22nd-25th), immediately followed by the British Ski Championships at Mürren (February 26th). The International University Winter Games will come off at St. Moritz (February 4th-10th) and the VIIIth Arlberg-Kandahar Ski Race in Mürren (March 9th-10th).

Around these big events are grouped a great number of ski meetings, all of which show excellent sport.

**A VISIT TO THE INTERNATIONAL GIRL GUIDES CHALET, ADELBODEN.**

"Il faudrait de la neige et il n'y en a pas," is what a seven-year old French girl kept on saying, as the stately Alpine omnibus left the station at Frutigen passing through the green pasture land on either side of the road, but before the journey of 16Km. came to an end, the snow fell down in great masses of white flakes, and fully satisfied the heart's desire of my little travelling companion!

A few evenings later, I had the pleasure of assisting at a Camp fire at the Girl Guides' chalet. It had snowed all day and the white blanket was now a meter in depth, and as the Guides' chalet is situated about ½ hr. from the village, the journey was undertaken on skis and in a blinding snowstorm. We were greeted by the warden, Miss I. von Herrenschwand and a family of about 25 girls spending a sport holiday of varying duration. These came from French Switzerland, German Switzerland, England, France and Germany.

At about 8 p.m. the whole company assembled in the spacious dining hall. A bundle of pine branches were set ablaze on the great square hearth; soon these flared up and illuminated the bright faces of the guides who were seated on sheep-skin rugs in a semi-circle. Although these guides had never met previously, their familiar songs rendered in various languages united them all as a family. All sorts of plays further contributed to everyone's enjoyment, and the evening passed only too quickly.

The following further details concerning this international Girl Guide centre may interest some of your readers:

The Chalet was given to all the Girl Guides of the World by Mrs. James J. Storrow, one of our American Girl Guide Sisters. On one of the beams in the big dining-room has been put an inscription in remembrance of this gift:

"To Helen Storrow our World Sisterhood owes this Chalet for the promotion of goodwill and understanding between nations."

The donor visited the whole of Switzerland, and took some three years to find this most beautiful spot at the foot of the massive of the Lohner with a full view of the Niesen range and Wildstrubel. The typical Bernese chalet was chosen for this international home, as nothing else would fit in so well with the surroundings. The two-storey house is very spacious with a slightly slanted copper roof, loaded with stones. As it is built on the mountain slope, the *sous-sol* can be entered on a level with the ground. There we find the store-rooms, central heating apparatus, bath-rooms, etc. On the first floor is the large dining-hall with a homely open chimney, a library and reading and writing rooms. On the upper floor are the sleeping quarters. There are a few single rooms, rooms with 2 and 3 beds, a dormitory with 5 and one with 7 beds. On the top-floor are the regular camping quarters where 28 girls slept on mattresses this Christmas and had a glorious time. All these rooms are warmed by central heating, which makes the coldest winter nights comfortable.

This centre has already proved a great success, as since the opening in 1932 about 1000 guides from 22 different nations have come into contact with one another through this holiday home.
