Having done so well with our countryman's famous book on his epic ride from the Argentine to the States — From Southern Cross to Pole Star — as well as with the children's version thereof, called the "Tale of Two Horses," is it any wonder that Heinemann's hasten to publish also Tschiffely's third and latest work in a specially nice get-up? The "Bridle Paths" in question are not so far off this time, nor yet so strenuous, dangerous or exacting to man and beast, but nonetheless the story unfolded in this book appeals to the spirit of adventure in the reader, though of a more contemplative order. Another ride of our classic rider it is indeed, but no farther afield than the West of England, a pleasant leisurely jaunt through England's green and pleasant land, as the saying goes. From the New Forest through Berkshire, Gloucester, Shropshire along the Welsh Border, skipping factory-ridden Lancashire on a railway truck for the lucious dales of Westmoreland, up to South-West Scotland, ending at Dumbarton on the Clyde.

What a pleasant summer's holiday, what a delightful way of penetrating into the very heart of that side of England which is old, yet ever young, which is not modernized, yet the best of this race whose hospitality we are privileged to enjoy! Tschiffely did not ride forth this time to make any other discoveries than the soul of the simple country-folk, he had no other purpose than to enjoy himself. And so the book he has written about it is not meant to be a guide, but consists of leisurely ambling notes at random, of observations of people's habits in those wild Wests of England, where the motor-car is rightly regarded as a soul-killing nuisance, — of nature's abundant heauty, of horses, barmaids and erstwhile ostlers.
