HORBER "SCHUETZENKOENIG."

FOUNDATION OF SPANISH CHAMBER OF COMMERCE IN SWITZERLAND.

The Chamber of Commerce for Spain was founded in Zurich last week, under the Presi-dency of M. D. M. Fuster. M. Jgnacio Melo, in Geneva, has been appointed as Secretary.

NEW SWISS MINISTER IN WASHINGTON.

As reported in our last issue, Dr. K. Brugg-mann, until recently Swiss Minister in Prague, has been appointed Swiss Minister in Washing-

Dr. Bruggmann was born in Oberhelfenschwil (Toggenburg) in 1889. He studied law at the Universities of Strassburg, Heidelberg, Berlin and Berne. After having practised for some time as an advocate in St. Gall he entered the Diplomatic Service of the Confederation in 1917. He occupied posts at the Legations in St. Petersburg, Brussels, Washington and Paris, since 1927, he was Minister in Prague.

SWISS MEMORIAL TO KING ALBERT.

The Belgian Minister to Switzerland, Count Louis d'Ursel, unveiled a monument to the late King Albert above Gryon, in the Alpes Vaudoises. The ceremony was attended by Belgian ex-Service men who had come from Brussels and by many Belgians who were interned in Switzerland during the Great War.

With the help of contributions from Belgian and Swiss Alpinists, the Belgian ex-Service men have acquired a big chalet about half an hour above Gryon (3.717ft.), on the path leading to Anzeinda, in the Alpes Vaudoises. Belgian, Luxemburg, and Swiss climbers will thus be able to spend cheap holidays in the chalet, which contains 12 double-bedded rooms and a dormitory for over 30 persons. The monument unveiled is in the garden, which is full of alpine flowers. It consists of a large stone weighing about five tons, found locally, which reproduces exactly the features of the famous rock at

Marches-les-Dames on which King Albert lost his life while climbing. In this stone is set a bronze tablet representing King Albert with his well-known cap, his spectacles, and rucksack, climb-ing along a steep rock wall.

SWISS BANK CORPORATION

The board of the Swiss Bank Corporation have decided, in principle, to establish an agency in New York under the style "Swiss Bank Corporation, New York Agency." The general managers of the bank have been instructed to take the needful steps for the opening of this agency and to apply for the necessary licence.

PRINCE ABBOT AT THE GREAT ST. BERNARD.

The new Provost and Prince Abbot of the Bernardines, Mgr. Adam, has been consecrated at Martigny, in Canton Valais.

According to tradition, the Prince Abbot walked up to the Hospice on the snowbound Great St. Bernard Pass, in front of which the Prior and all his monks were waiting for him. When enthroned in the chapel the Prince Abbot was presented with the mitre and the ring of St. Bernard. After Mass there was dinner in the refectory, and a visit was paid to the St. Bernard dogs. The Prince Abbot then walked down again through the snow to the Cantine de Proz, where his car was waiting to take him back to Martigny.
