A BRITISH AND FOREIGN BIBLE SOCIETY DEPUTATION TOUR IN SWITZERLAND.

The present political situation in Europe and the plight of the small nations like Switzerland now almost surrounded by dictatorship countries are gradually working for a change of outlook on life. Many people now clearly visualise that "man does not live by bread alone" and a new atmosphere is thus created which is very favourable to religious thought. The general message of the Bible as the Word of GOD has to-day a far greater opportunity and is being accepted far more universally than at any period during the last sixty years. For these reasons our deputation tour to Switzerland could not have chosen a more favourable time.

Our team consisted of Mr. A. L. Haig, the general secretary of the society for Central Europe, Mrs. A. M. Bevan, for fifteen years leader of Bible House, Addis Abbaba, and the writer.

We left London on the 27th January and did not return till the end of February. During this time some twenty-one public meetings were held covering a large part of North Eastern Switzerland. Our aim was to reach the largest centres of population and our prearranged programme brought us to Berne, Thonue, Langenthal, Huttwil, Lucerne, Aarau, Baden, Zurich and Bale.

Although the British and Foreign Bible Society has been responsible for the printing of over 19,000 New Testaments and Bibles in the two different dialects of the ancient Romansch language, sold at popular prices, the wonderful world-wide work of that society was largely unknown to most of our audiences. We addressed over 2,000 people and everywhere without exception our hearers were most receptive and sympa-

thetic. Also the actual existence of a Swiss Bible Committee in Lucerne and the engagement of a Swiss colporteur by our British friends in London was all news to our Swiss public. Our parting lecture was held in the missionary college of St. Chrischona near Bale. It is noteworthy to mention that from 1864 to 1904 the B.F.B.S. ordered the printing of four editions of the whole Bible in four different Ethiopian languages, in the printing works of St. Chrischona. Further over 60 different books of holy writ, hymns, and other religious literature were issued by the same press in the main tongues of the people of Abyssinia. Mrs. A. M. Bevan, whose story of that country has fascinated so many of our Swiss hearers, was extremely gratified in coming into personal touch with such a great centre of Ethiopian culture as our college of St. Chrischona.

Another item of national interest is the co-operation of the British and Foreign Bible Society at the coming Zurich exhibition. We took these opportunities to confer with the leaders of the National Church of Switzerland and as a result many thousands of single Gospels in the national languages are now in course of being printed in Switzerland. This is the first time that the B.F.B.S. has printed the Zurich (Zwingli) Bible. Also the timely assistance of Mr. Hans Burkhardt, the Swiss colporteur, who is going to be in charge of a special Bible Kiosk at the Zurich exhibition is another contribution to Switzerland worthy of the great English Bible society of Queen Victoria Street, London,
