### REPATRIATION OF SWISS.

Arrangements have now been completed with reference to the special convoy which our Legation has been endeavouring to fix up.

The party will leave Euston to-night and arrive early on Sunday morning at a West Coast port where after the usual formalities have been gone through the participants will board two steamers belonging to the Swiss Shipping Agency. The two boats — "Calanda" and "Maloja" — will sail under the Panama flag with the name "Switzerland" prominently painted on the sides; they will be lit up during night time and their safe passage is guaranteed by the belligerent parties. The passengers will disembark at Bilbao and travel by train to Geneva via Cerberes.

The party will probably consist of about 250, and all those who have definitely booked have been asked last Thursday by wire to assemble at Swiss House to-day between 10 a.m. and 4 p.m.
