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The Society held its Monthly Meeting at Swiss House on Saturday, November 8th. Mr. J. J. Boos presided, and a large number of members and friends were present. It was in fact the best attended meeting for some considerable time. The formal proceedings were followed by what was in fact the chief attraction of the afternoon, a film show which the Society was able to give by kind permission of the Swiss Minister, Monsieur W. Thurnheer, featuring the National Exhibition at Zurich. Although many of those present had personally visited the Exhibition, they were eager to see a film which evoked such happy memories, whereas the less fortunate ones, who only knew the Exhibition from hearsay, were able to obtain a better idea of our national enterprise. All that is great in Swiss art, industry and tradition seemed to be represented in this truly magnificent Exhibition. A special word of thanks is due to Mr. Fer of Messrs. Cinex Ltd. (distributors of the famous Swiss film projectors manufactured by Paillard & Co., Ste. Croix and Yverdon), who not only provided the projector and talking apparatus, but personally projected the films, all of which were talkies, and overcame the technical difficulties in an admirable manner.

This was by no means the end of an excellent programme. Through the kind offices of Mr. G. Keller, President of the Foreign Press Association and, we are proud to say, a former student of the S.M.S. College, the Society was able to show four films produced by the Ministry of Information. The President referred to Mr. Keller as the unofficial Minister of Information to the Swiss Colony in London. Three of the films portrayed Britain's sea power, whereas the fourth was actually taken in our homeland. The first film. "Sea Cadets," showed the coming generation being introduced to the intricacies of modern seamanship. How strong the call of the sea is to the young Britisher was clearly evidenced in this excellent film, which also gave one an idea of the meticulously thorough training given to prospective seafarers. A second film, "Mer-chantmen at Sea," depicted the arduous and often mortally dangerous life of the seamen who are engaged in keeping the lifelines of this country open, whilst yet a third "Steel goes to Sea," showed how ships which traverse the Seven Seas are built. One could see a huge merchantman gradually assuming shape from out a mass of steel girders, stanchions and plates. Each man engaged on any of the various shipbuilding processes is a highly skilled craftsman, his skill being handed down from father to son, from generation to generation.

The last film, "Line 2," was particularly suited for the audience, for it showed a telephone line being



built to the Tschierva Hut of the Swiss Alpine Club. From a picturesque valley in the Engadine, the line was taken by sturdy workmen across a dangerous mountain stream, over precipitous slopes and deep ravines, until finally the goal was reached. The film served a dual purpose, in that it showed the hazards of workmen engaged in bringing the inventions of modern science to the remotest parts of almost inaccessible mountains, revealing at the same time the superb scenery of the Swiss Alps. A homely atmosphere was created by well known Swiss tunes which interspersed the commentary. Every credit is due to the M.O.I. for this excellent film, which incidentally is also a fine piece of propaganda for our country.

At the conclusion of the film-show, Mr. W. Deutsch proposed a cordial vote of thanks to the Committee for arranging such an entertaining afternoon, and once more thanked Mr. Fer for having made it possible for these talkies to be shown. The meeting heartily supported Mr. Deutsch with prolonged applause.

The next Meeting of the Society will be held at Swiss House on Saturday, December 13th at 2.30 p.m., and will be followed by a meeting of the Philatelic Group.
