### SWISS CHORAL SOCIETY.

The Annual General Meeting of the Swiss Choral Society was held on October 29th, 1943, at the Swiss Club, Charlotte Street, W.1.

The President, Mr. F. G. Sommer, opened the meeting at 7 p.m. with words of welcome to 31 active members present.

The Hon. Secretary then read the Minutes of the last meeting and the Hon. Treasurer gave his report on the finances of the Society, both reports being received with prolonged acclamation and unanimously accepted.

The most important event of the evening was to discuss the proposal formulated by the President and seconded by Mr. F. Conrad, to elect His Excellency the Swiss Minister, Monsieur W. Thurnheer, as Honorary President of the Society. The Choir was delighted to hear His Excellency's reply at a subsequent rehearsal and feels greatly honoured; there is no doubt that His Excellency's acceptance will give great impetus and encouragement to all the Members to continue the practice of those customs which are so treasured by our people at home.

A new music Commission was also elected to select new songs and it is hoped that we may obtain new songs from Switzerland in the near future.

Two new auditors were also elected.

The meeting confirmed the continuance of fortnightly rehearsals at Swiss House, 35, Fitzroy Square, W.1, every other Friday from 6.30 to 8 p.m.

The President then welcomed several new active Members who joined the Choir during the past season and expressed satisfaction for the way the Choir is growing, having now 41 active Members, the highest figure ever attained. Upon this happy note the President closed the meeting thanking the Members for their attention.
