A SWISS REALITY.

On every shelf in the show-cabinet are many and varied interesting souvenirs. The knowledge of them brings back vivid pictures to my mind, unfortunately, not realized in every life. The show-cabinet is not the ordinary type, glass three sides, with wooden back. It resembles one in a museum, fitted with oak; glass all round. It is a real Swiss cabinet; hand carved by the countrymen in Switzerland. Each flower is intact, and each leaf too. Edelweiss, gentian and Alpine rose are carved out in marvellous array. It was bought during my many visits there some years ago.

Hand-carved woodwork was remarkably cheap then, and it is everlasting wear.

Many of the relics were collected from the high mountains climbed, others from the various 22 Cantons. I wanted a special place to keep them, see them, and show them, and pictures of a Swiss reality.
