CONRAD BRAUCHLI†

The "Swiss Observer" deeply regrets to announce the recent death of Mr. C. Brauchli.

Mr. Conrad Brauchli was a native from Berg, canton Thurgau; he came to this country just over 40 years ago as representative of the Swiss Silk Manufacturers, Messrs. Siber and Wehrli. Thanks to his great capability and hard work he soon became a partner in the firm's London agents, Messrs. Louis Hermes and Son, tie fabrics manufacturers.

When his senior partner retired, previous to the first world war, he started his own firm as a tie fabric agent and merchant, and for over 30 years represented in this country some of the most important continental firms. He was, undoubtedly for many years the most important supplier for the British tie trade.

Mr. Brauchli was an example and inspiration for a good many young Swiss who endeavoured to start their career in the silk trade for men's wear. He was always willing to give advice, and many of the younger generation remember the jovial evenings they were allowed to spend in his pleasant home "Sunnyside" in Hertfordshire, where buyers and suppliers met on equal ground free of the stiff "City etiquette".

The deceased has done more than anybody else to enhance the Swiss reputation as experts of tie fabrics in this country, and some of the leading British manufacturers often found it necessary to seek his advice when creating new fashions, etc., for the men's neckwear trade.

Mr. Brauchli was a member of the City Swiss Club, and a generous benefactor to the Swiss Church. He leaves a widow to whom we extend our deepest sympathy. The Swiss Colony is the poorer for his passing.
