SPORTS EVENTS.

Cycling.

The World Championships in the various cycling competitions have taken place in Holland during the last ten days of August. Switzerland sent a considerable number of professionals and amateurs to Amsterdam and it was generally hoped that they would carry off one or two world titles. These hopes could, however, not be realised. In the road competition only Ferdinand Kübler, Adliswil (winner of the Tour de Suisse) showed a good performance and finished the race in the seventh rank. All other Swiss participants ended far behind. As to the Swiss amateurs they proved to be weaker than their opponents and could not stand the pace of a 200 km, race.

In the track events, our compatriots were equally little successful. In the motor-paced events the Swiss competitors were eliminated already in the first round.

In the scratch 1000 metres competition for amateurs, none of our competitors reached the final or the semi-finals. Only two Swiss cyclists came up to expectations: O. Blattner (Berne) finished fourth in the final of the sprint races for professionals. Hugo Koblet (Zurich) was fourth in the pursuit competitions for professionals over 5 km. In the semi-final he had to start against G. Schulte (Holland) and lost only by 1/10th of a second, Schulte winning in the end the world champion title.

Tennis.

The Tennis Club of Berne organised admirably the Swiss Tennis Championship from 20th to 25th August. There were some surprising results and our new champions are the following :—

Single men : P. Granges, Geneva. Single women : Miss Rigollet, Lausanne. Mens' double : Huonder—J. P. Blondel (Zurich— Lausanne). Ladies' double : Misses Sutz-Keller (Zurich).

Mixed doubles : Miss Sutz-H. Huonder (Zurich).
