Federal

The Federal Council has nominated Dr. Raphael Cottier, of the Federal Office for Traffic, to the post of Director of the Central Office for International Railway Traffic in succession to Dr. Hunziker.

Dr. Raphael Cottier was born on the 22nd of January, 1891, in Jaun (Ct. Fribourg). He studied juris prudence at the University of Fribourg where he obtained the degree of doctor of law. He started his career as Secretary of the Federal Press control commission, and later on became Secretary of the Swiss Traders Association. In 1919, he entered into the services of the Swiss Federal Railways and two years later (1921) was appointed General Secretary, and in 1935 District Manager of the S.F.R. (Zurich).

During the month of August, 1949, the Swiss Federal Railways carried 19.20 million passengers or two million more than in August, 1948, the receipts increased by 3.11 million francs to 29.95 million francs.

Goods traffic, however, decreased by 18,271 tons and amounted to a total of 1.38 million tons the receipts of which amounted to 27.56 million francs, a decrease of 142,000.—frs. [A.T.S.]

The newly appointed Tscheco-Slovak Minister, Dr. Arnold Tauber, presented his credentials to Monsieur M. Petitpierre, Swiss Foreign Minister, in Berne.

The new Minister was born in 1913, and studied law at the University of Prague. In 1939, he was interned by the Germans and spent six years in various concentration camps. In 1945, he received an important appointment at the Foreign Office in Prague, and since then has represented his country at various international conferences. [A.T.S.]

Replying to questions in Parliament M. Nobs, President of the Confederation and head of the Federal Finance Department, made a long statement on the Government's decision not to devalue the franc.

Sterling and other devaluations in fact brought the various currencies to their real level in comparison with the Swiss franc, M. Nobs said. The gold value of the franc would foster imports, and increased imports would, on the one hand, prevent a rise in the Swiss cost of living and, on the other, supply foreign countries with Swiss currency with which they would be able to buy Swiss products and allow their holiday-makers to visit Switzerland. As regards exports, M. Nobs said, only a half went to the sterling area, so that the losses, if there were any, would not be as big as supposed. Anxiety was nevertheless felt in some exporting industries and in the hotel industry, but the Government was ready to examine with these industries measures likely to minimize the disadvantages deriving from foreign devaluation.

Cantonal

On the occasion of the silver wedding day anniversary, Mr. Adolf Dätwyler, a former "Kantonsrat" and Manager of the "Schweiz. Draht- & Gummiwerke", in Altdorf (Ct. Uri), has given an amount of 10,000.—frs. to the cantonal hospital in Altdorf. [A.T.S.]

Much to his surprise, instead of two, three young men appeared one of whom was limping. Soon after the driver had started the car with his passengers he received several blows with an iron bar. Although seriously injured, he was able to eject one of the attackers from the car whereupon the three men took to their heels. The motorist managed to drive as far as Dietikon, where he received medical attention, and where the police was informed.

Two of the assailants, both Austrians, were later on arrested in Wattwil (Ct. St. Gall), the third one, also an Austrian has not yet been found. [A.T.S.]

Army

The Chief of Staff of the Army of Thailand (Siam), Major-General D. Dejpradiyudh, in company with a number of high grade officers has paid an official visit to the Swiss army, studying its organisation and equipment. The party was received by Federal Councillor, Dr. Kobelt, Head of the Federal Military Department. [A.T.S.]

A special appeal by Dr. K. Kobelt, Federal Councillor and Chief of the Military Department, has recently been addressed to Swiss women to enlist in the newly legalized women's military service branch, known as Women's Complementary Service.

"The conduct of modern war imposes new and important tasks on our army, the execution of which the entire population should participate in," explained Mr. Kobelt in his appeal to Swiss women. During the course of the last war, already, Swiss women did serve the army in several jobs, but it was not until January 1st of this year that the Women's Complementary Service received its new legal status allowing its members full rights granted to all soldiers such as insurance, subsistence, loss of salary compensation, as well as the right to a uniform and equipment.

"In times of peace, the Women's Complementary Service is only constituted by an empyronic organization, which in case of mobilization would be rapidly complemented by recruiting other women," declared the Chief of the Military Department in giving a strong hint as to what might come in a future mobilization of Swiss armed forces. He further declared the WCS could not fulfill its purpose without the regular enlist-

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ment of about 500 women per year, in appealing to the patriotism of Swiss women for the realization of this important section of the Swiss army.

Economics

The Swiss engineering industry had full employment last year, but for the first time in several years the output of finished products was above the quantity of orders received. The unemployment figures for June this year showed an increase.

The 15th Swiss export week will be held in Zurich from November 21st to 26th. Collections will be shown in the individual showrooms of manufacturers of dresses, coats, suits, jersey styles, blouses, sportswear, children's wear and hats.

The Swiss Federal Council has replied to a question submitted during the summer session of Parliament regarding the activities of an international trust (Standard Oil [Esso]) in Switzerland.

The reply states that it has not escaped the attention of the Federal Council that a subsidiary of a foreign enterprise has attempted to gain a decisive influence over the Swiss fuel market and that it has particularly aimed at bringing holders of petrol stations under its dependency.

The reply adds that the Federal Council is also of the opinion that the control of the market by a single company, as well as the transformation of hitherto independent businesses of the automobile trade into depots of a large enterprise, would not be desirable.

The Council asserts that the Swiss automobile trade has found its own means of defence, but that as the success of such measures would first have to be awaited, there is no occasion at the moment for the authorities to intervene, apart from the fact that from a legal point of view there are only limited possibilities for State intervention.

Whether or not, however, general decrees regarding cartels and trusts should be prepared is a question which will have to be considered in connection with other questions put before the Federal Council, adds the reply. Apart from this, the Council will continue to pay full attention to the matter.

The return of the Swiss National Bank for the week ended September 30th was awaited with special interest, the previous week's statement not yet having shown any changes of importance as a result of the devaluation of sterling and other currencies.

Gold stocks during the period dropped by as much as Frs.132m. to Frs.6,158m. Foreign exchange holdings declined by Frs.115.2m. to Frs.188m. The total loss in the exchange reserves thus amounted to Frs.247.2m.

This latter figure merely reflects the equivalent sum required to meet demands for U.S. dollars. A like loss not specified in the bank's return had to be parted with additionally in respect of sterling and other currencies, but such dealings were effected for the account of the Confederation under existing payments agreements.

For the second month in succession British exports to Switzerland show a decline. While in July the decrease amounted to Frs.400,000 compared with the

previous month, the drop in August was Frs. 4.2m., bringing British exports to this country down to Frs. 20.7m. Against the peak of May of 1948, this latter figure is almost halved. Swiss exports to the U.K. amounted to Frs.13m. during August, compared with Frs.16.4m. during the previous month.

It is announced that the ending of the Belgo-Swiss payments agreements, which should have been on October 13th as the result of the three months' notice given by Belgium in July, has been postponed for a month.

It has also been arranged that the Belgo-Swiss tourist agreement which expired at the end of September shall be prolonged to November 13th pending further discussions.

The original termination of the payments agreement was intended to secure a de facto devaluation of the Belgian franc against the Swiss. At the same time, it was proposed not to renew the tourist agreement, so that Belgian visitors to Switzerland would have no recourse except to the black or "free" market for their Swiss francs.

The position has now changed since the Belgian franc has been formally devalued by 14 per cent. against the Swiss. Moreover, under the influence of fears of ultimate devaluation in Switzerland the free market quotation of B.Frs.11.525 for the Swiss franc is a slight discount on the new official parity of B.Frs.11.5536.
