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
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Referring back again to our Anniversary Number, another of my collaborators, who signs his articles as "Gallus" wrote, on the occasion of my twenty years connection with this paper, an appreciation dealing with my work, which made me almost blush. I decided there and then, that those, who so unselfishly, so modestly and so generously have given me their help and services in editing this paper should not go unnamed, and after much persuasion I have, at long last, obtained their permission to introduce them to our readers.

J. Schad, was born and educated in Basle, his father came from Ziefen, a village less than twenty miles from Basle, his mother was a native of the canton of Aargau.

The Schad's are well-known in the "Baselbiet" where they have been peasant small holders for generations past, one of them, named Uli Schad, became famous as one of the leaders of the peasant rebellion in the 17th century; the rising was suppressed and Uli Schad was executed in Basle in 1653. His memory, and that of the ringleaders is perpetuated by a monument, the "Bauerndenkmal" in Liestal.

Being not of a rebellious nature, as far as I can detect, nor having any inclination to till the native soil, our friend left Switzerland at the age of 18 in order to follow a commercial career, and after staying several years in France arrived in this great Metropolis in 1904. Hard work, coupled with a keen intelligence and a shrewd business mind, gained him in time

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the Directorship of an important company in the City, and he was also invited to serve on the committee of one of the great Trade Associations in the City of London.

J. Schad is a happily married man and father of two sons and a daughter; his eldest son is a B.A. of Oxford University, an old "blue" and officer in the Royal Air Force. The younger boy gained a State scholarship and is an undergraduate at Christ Church, Oxford, and his daughter has just brilliantly passed her matriculation, indeed a proud family record, which should gladden any father's heart.

Though a successful business man, J.J.F.S. is also an intellectual, widely read, with a predilection for history and the classics. Poetry too appeals strongly to him as can be perceived by his many translations into English verse of most of the well-known Swiss folk songs. Some real gems of his own verse, sonnets, essays and literary reviews have appeared in our paper during the last twenty years.

This prolific output has been achieved in his spare time and at odd moments; by his pen he has given readers of the "Swiss Observer" untold pleasure and if this publication, has, in spite of some set backs, achieved, in my humble opinion, a certain popularity in the Swiss Colony in Great Britain, it is, in no small measure, due to J. Schad and I gladly take this opportunity to thank him for his ever ready help, his sincere friendship and for the joy he has given me in reading his clever contributions.
