Federal

The Swiss Federal Railways have carried during the month of December (1948) altogether 16.44 million passen-

gers or 1.22 million less than in December, 1947. The receipts from passenger traffic show a decline of 1.48 million francs and are given as 19.99 million francs.

1.39 million tons of goods were dispatched or 247,312 tons less than in December, 1947, the receipts reached 26.99 million francs.

Customs receipts during January, 1949, amounted to 34.5 million francs, or 10.1 million francs less than in January, 1948.

The Federal Council has nominated Hans Martig, hitherto Swiss Consul in Istambul, to the post of Swiss Consul in Tunis.

Hans Martig, who hails from St. Stephan (Ct. Berne) entered into the service of the Federal Political Department in 1923, and was at one time at the Swiss Legation in London. In 1928, he was transferred to Istambul where he was appointed Consul in 1944.

The net profit of the Swiss National Bank for 1948 is approximately Frs.5.4m. Net profit for the previous year was Frs.5,413,000. The dividend is repeated at 6 per cent.

During the past year, gold transfers by foreign central banks amounted to Frs.200m. Taking into consideration a transfer by the Swiss Confederation of Frs. 434m., the National Bank's total gold stocks reached the value of Frs.5,821m., of which as much as two-thirds were deposited abroad. In addition, the Confederation owns gold worth Frs.182m.

Foreign exchange holdings, consisting almost exclusively of dollar assets, were valued at Frs.236.6m. at end-1948.

Bank notes in circulation at the end of December were Frs.211m. up at Frs.4,594m., against an increase of Frs.293m. during the previous year. The gold cover at end-1948 amounted to 127 per cent., the cover prescribed by law being only 40 per cent.

The balance-sheet total at Frs.6,400m. was Frs. 470m. higher than a year previously. The main revenue item, Frs.7.17m. (1947: Frs.10.67m.), was derived from gold and foreign exchange transactions..

Visas will no longer be needed by Swiss nationals visiting New Zealand and South Africa.

The Soviet zone of Germany has concluded a new trade agreement with Switzerland.

The agreement contains a list of goods to be exchanged and stipulates that 30 per cent. of Swiss payments must be used for purchases by the Soviet zone in Switzerland.

Under the previous agreement trade had consisted mainly of Soviet zone export to Switzerland by which the Russians had gained large quantities of Swiss currency.

A contract has been signed between the Swiss authorities and the de Havilland aircraft and engine companies in England, whereby, following the supply of a large number of Vampire aircraft from the English de Havilland factories, the type will be manufactured in Switzerland under a licence, thus increasing the overall output of Vampires.

It was necessary for the Swiss Air Force to try out exhaustively the functioning and general practicability of the Vampire in the Alpine country which it must defend, and for which a short take-off run with full war load, and a high standard of manoeuvrability and docility, are obviously indispensable. Satisfied on on these points, the Swiss Government have already ordered 75 Vampire Mk. 6's from de Havilland, de-


Details of the presentation ceremony will be published in the Swiss Observer in due course, and any friends who wish to attend this celebration will be given an opportunity of doing so.

Dr. G. A. Wehrli, founder of the "Medizinischgeschichtlichen Museums" and lecturer of medicine at the University of Zurich, aged 61.


Albert Renggli-Gloggner, for 60 years in practice as a dentist in Lucerne, at the age of 89.

The accounts of the Federal Singing Competition (Eidg. Sängerfest) which took place last year in Berne, close with a deficit of 28,892.77.—frs.; this festival was held in conjunction with the celebration "100 Jahre Schweiz. Bundesstaat." Altogether 104 choirs with 12,035 members attended the festival.

As reason for the deficit the very bad weather which persisted throughout the Festival is given.

The University of Fribourg will observe its 60th anniversary on September 5th, 1949. It now has 1,043 students, 363 of whom are non-Swiss.

The appeal by Swiss Radio for Europe's sick and needy children has so far raised £40,230.

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The 17th Annual Congress of the Society of Internal Medicine will be held at Lugano on May 6th to 8th, 1949.

Legislation has been carried through in Switzerland giving the Government power to use wireless telephony as part of their national telephone service.

It is intended that places which cannot easily be reached by wires, such as isolated villages, mountain hotels and chalets, will be connected to the main network by the new service. Subscribers who wish to use these facilities will pay an additional standing charge of less than a pound per month. Power consumption will be only a few watts per station, and short waves (4-7.5 metres will be used.

An extension of the service to private motor cars was also approved. These are only further additions to the excellent telephone service which already exists in Switzerland, where even trunk calls are obtained—and charged—automatically by dial telephone.

Le dernier concert de la Philharmonie tchèque à Prague a été un triomphe pour le compositeur suisse Arthur Honegger. Son oratorio "Le roi David" a obtenu un grand succès.

SWISS PUBLISHING.

Many publications in praise of Switzerland have appeared lately; some of them were reviewed in these pages. There can be little doubt that Switzerland, her scenery, her people and her institutions are becoming increasingly familiar to English readers and it is a gratifying fact that no jarring note has been introduced by any of the modern writers who have chosen Switzerland as their subject. From a technical point of view English publishers are to be congratulated on the high standard they have maintained under the severe handicap of war-time restrictions.

The Swiss publishing trade, on the other hand, is also of a high order and compares favourably with that of Great Britain. Those who have visited the Swiss Book Exhibition held in London a few years ago will concur. The Swiss productions, in fact, are in no way inferior to those of the English publishers and the art of printing which was exercised in Switzerland from times medieval has suffered no decline.

These reflections were prompted by the cursory examination of specimen copies received from the publishing firm "Verlag Paul Haupt in Berne." One of them is a small illustrated periodical called "Der Hochwächter" which provides, in German and in dialect, short stories and essays dealing with Swiss life, arts and handicraft in the manner of a popular magazine suitable for home reading. Another is taken from a collection by the name of "Schweizer Heimatsbücher." These are monographs on various subjects: studies of Swiss writers, towns, monasteries and famous landmarks. One of them "The Lake of Lucerne" is available in an English translation and is adorned with a number of photographs of great beauty illustrating the many beanty spots of the lakeside and the surrounding heights.

Currency regulations complicate the acquisition of such books, however moderate their cost. Nevertheless, with the ever-widening public interest in art and literature, it may not be inopportune to draw attention to the excellence of the work offered by Swiss publishers.
