
An excellent tea, with just those good things which are the delight of all children was served. Father Christmas made his happy appearance and later a Conjuror had the Children all agog with his magic tricks.

CHRISTMAS AND NEW YEAR'S SERVICE PARTY OF SWISS CATHOLICS.

The Church of St. Peters and St. Edwards, Palace Street, Westminster, S.W.1. was just large enough to hold the very large Congregation assembled on Sunday, January 1st, 1950, for this year's Christmas and New Year's Service. The Chaplain, Father Lanfranchi, in a moving sermon, in English and German (the latter for the benefit of the many new young temporary Swiss residents over here now) reminded his hearers of the real meaning of the Christian Christmas and the Christmas presents, the best present being the receipt, through prayers and devotion, the blessings of the Christchild born for the salvation of all men of goodwill.

Solemn Benediction was given by Father Gut of M.H.B. assisted by the two Anglo-Swiss will-be-priests —Rev. Gasche and Rev. De Maria, sons of well known Swiss families in the Colony. The mixed Choir sung Christmas Carols and the hymns during the service.

The Christmas party, arranged for young and old, at the spacious Westminster Cathedral Hall was equally well patronised, some 70 children and about 300 adults enjoying an excellent tea, refreshments and songs by the Choir. The children in particular enjoyed the tricks of the conjuror and the antics and wit of "Archie" the ventriloquist's dummy.

Every child, thanks to the generosity of the compatriots, received a handsome present, and some fruit from the hands of Father Christmas, who under the shade of the large and nicely lit and decorated Christmas tree, exhorted the children to be good and faithful children and obedient to their parents in the year just started.

In the Church and at the Party we had the great pleasure of seeing the Swiss Minister and Madame de Torrenté, accompanied by Colonel Ryser and Dr. Umbricht of the Legation.

The children having had their share, the not-soyoung came into their element about 7.30 p.m. when they took up the meriment with singing Swiss songs and dancing to the tune of Swiss accordion players.

It was a great treat to see so many old and young Swiss in happy and merry mood, the bable of the various tongues proved that compatriots from all over Switzerland mingled on this memorable occasion, a real happy Swiss party away from the homeland.

Great thanks are due to Father Lanfranchi who almost single handed arranged the party, and his untiring helpers on the day, particularly those behind the scenes preparing and serving the refreshments, all free of charge, also the many donors of the gifts, in kind and cash.
