## NEWCOMER TO LONDON MUSIC.

Rudolf am Bach, pianist, will make his *début* at a recital at Wigmore Hall, on Sunday, March 11th, 1951.

He was born in 1919, and is a citizen of Zurich, he received his first piano lessons at a very early age from his father, who was a conductor in that town. When 13 years of age, he became a pupil of Professor Emile Frey of Zurich.

In 1936, he entered the "Konservatorium" in Zurich and two years later (1938) obtained first prize from the Hegar Fund of the above-mentioned institute, and the diploma for piano teaching. In 1939, Rudolf am Bach qualified for the diploma for concert performances with the degree *summa cum laude*, and became a pupil of the late Professor Frédéric Lamond. In 1940, he was awarded first prize at the National Swiss Music Competition in Geneva. Since 1939, he has occupied the post of teacher at the School of Music of the "Musikkollegium" in Winterthur.

During the last 10 years Rudolf am Bach has appeared as soloist at a number of concerts in the principal towns of Switzerland, Italy, Germany, and Austria, under the conductorship of Dr. Fritz Brun, Dr. Scherschen, Paul Sacher, Ansermet, H. von Karajam, Raphael Kubelik and others.

In a great many concert notices which have appeared in Swiss and foreign papers, he is praised for his "brilliant technique" and "a thorough acquaintance with works from Bach, Mozart, Beethoven, Weber and Liszt."

We heartily recommend the recital of this brilliant artist and compatriot of ours to our readers, and hope that he will register "full house".

Rudolf am Bach will play works from J. S. Bach, Mozart, Beethoven and Brahms.

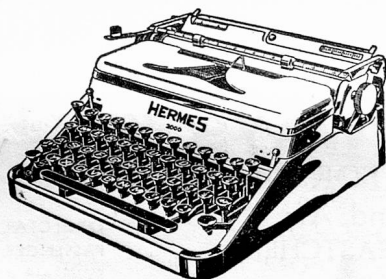
