SWITZERLAND IN ENGLISH LITERATURE

Research into the literary connections between England and Switzerland has been carried out by more than one English writer. Sir Arnold Lunn, for example, and Professor de Beer, to name but two, have taken pains to collate such connections. In many of their books they have quoted British authors and travellers who, in their writings, have recorded their views and impressions. The Swiss and their country as seen through British eyes has been a fruitful and entertaining subject.

Similar research work is now being done in Switzerland. Dr. Gustav Schirmer has published a thesis on "Die Schweiz im Spiegel englischer und amerikanischer Literatur bis 1848." This was followed by Hans Loehrer's "Die Schweiz im Spiegel Englischer Literatur 1849-1875." and will be followed by W. Steffens who, under the same title, will

cover the period 1876-1900.

Hans Loehrer's work, published by the Juris-Verlag Zuerich, has been submitted to us for review. It constitutes a carefully prepared study of every English publication within the period in which Switzerland is referred to in some way or other, in prose or verse. Into this span of 25 years fall the writings of Matthew Arnold, Charlotte Bronte, George Eliot, John Ruskin, Leslie Stephen, Thackeray, Tyndall, Whymper and a considerable number of lesser-known British authors.

The work is divided into sections according to the subject matter dealt with, these being in turn subdivided into constituent parts. Thus the main-chapter "People" is split up into sub-chapters on Cleanliness, Health, Appearance, Social behaviour, Intelligence, Character, with quotations from English writers who have commented on them. Other main-chapters include Tourist Traffic, Labour, Culture, Cantons, Politics, also dissected into sub-headings.

All this analysis is done with efficiency and thoroughness. It is a highly specialised work, not likely to appeal to the general public, but a valuable reference book and guide to those who, professionally or otherwise, take an interest in this particular subject.
