A CONCERT BY A SWISS QUARTET.

Most of us know Conway Hall in Red Lion Square, Holborn, and some of us may have heard of the South Place Ethical Society to whom it belongs. But very few apparently are aware of the excellent concerts which this Society arrange there on Sunday evenings, in association with the Arts Council. This is the 62nd season of these concerts and to judge from the programmes most of the performances are of the highest standard, given by well-known artists. The extremely modest price of admission of 1/- should be an attraction for young people and students in particular.

The 1550th concert of this kind took place on 9th November. It was given by the Manoliu Quartet from Basle, Petru Manoliu (violin), Jules Joubert (violin), Louis Reisacher (viola), and Fritz Moser (cello). The programme began with the Mozart Quartet in C, (K.465). From the beginning one felt that very capable artists were performing. It is not for me to criticize or praise, but I have seldom heard the Quartet in A minor, Op.51, No.2 by Brahms played with such perfection. The artists completely captured the audience, and the atmosphere of excitement and happiness continued during the Dvorak Quartet in F, Op.96. The generous applause was very well deserved indeed, and my only regret was that so few of our friends and compatriots could share the experience. The Swiss Legation was represented by Dr. Lindt and Captain Specker.
