The Children's Party, in Westminster Cathedral Hall, was opened by the Catholic Mixed Choir, singing Carols. Then followed entertainment for the Children.

ALBERT FERBER RECITAL.

This masterly and assured Pianist played a varied Programme at Wigmore Hall on Friday, 18th January, 1952.

The Recital opened with Mozart's C Minor Fantasy followed by the Beethoven A Major Sonata Op. 101, not very often heard. It is a severe work with only a flash of the lighter Beethoven now and then, and therefore, inspite of Ferber's rendering, difficult to be appreciated and a severe test for the audience. Papillons op. 2 by Schumann played beautifully eased the tension.

The second part of the concert gave us 8 Preludes op. 28 by Chopin in which Ferber showed his genius in rythm, sonority and tone colour. The Four Etudes by Debussy — Five Fingers, Thirds, Fourths and octaves expounded the outstanding technique of Ferber but it was not merely a presentation of Finger exercises but Etudes with dexterity combined with highest musicianship.

Our sincere thanks to Albert Ferber for giving us as a first performance Alma Brasileira and the Floral Suite by the outstanding Brazilian composer Villa Lobos.

The enthusiastic Audience would not let the artist go until he had played as encores the lovely Elegie by Rachmaninoff and in a captivating manner Impromptu by Fauré.

So ended the Recital of our Swiss compatriot who is going from strength to strength. His intelligent interpretation and technical mastery, rythm, fortissimo without becoming jarred, his velvety touch in pianissimo without being blurred ranked him amongst the finest pianists and we look forward with impatient anticipation to hearing him again.

The attendance was exceedingly good and we noticed a satisfying sprinkling of compatriots. They were well recompensed by the great and unassuming artist.
