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SWISS Y.M.C.A. (Annual Report).

In reviewing the activities of the Swiss Y.M.C.A., 12 Bateman Street, W.1., during the past year, it is appropriate to emphasize that our motto has been:— "Render service to the young man from abroad", — a service which of necessity is very manifold.

Our meetings were held weekly on Thursday evenings, when lectures were given on a variety of subjects, and were followed by active discussions. Mr. B. Segall also offered his services by giving English lessons from 5 to 6 p.m. Among the many interesting talks which were given we should like to mention those on travels; some historic and scientific lectures dealt with the History and the Museums of London. The talks on Faith and Practice brought us in line with the main object of our meetings, namely to strengthen our faith in God, as we felt that this was the best preparation for the tests of life which a young man has to meet sooner or later.

We kept in touch with the English Y.M.C.A. centre which offers such opportunities as swimming and athletics. Our work is connected with the Swiss Churches as far as the spiritual side is concerned. The Annual Conference of old members of the Y.M.C.A.'s of London and Paris took place on the last Sunday in August in Zurich, and was well attended.

The work of the Y.M.C.A. in its social and world-wide aspect is known and need not be emphasized specially. However, the spiritual purpose of the movement is not always realised. We have found that a study of the Bible is essential to a knowledge of God. Dr. A. T. Schofield, a well known Harley Street specialist, once mentioned that a man's life was too short to exhaust the Bible. He was then 70 years old. It is true that this search after the truth requires a mind free from prejudice, but to know what God has to say about our life is of paramount importance. This is perhaps the most important difference between Christianity and all other religions, that in Christianity God is revealed to us not as a static thing, but a dynamic, pulsating activity, a life centred in the person of Jesus Christ. A true knowledge of God inevitably leads to a stronger, quieter and more radiant life.

In closing this report we wish to thank our donors at home and abroad for their support, and to those in Switzerland who read these lines we would say: "Make the Y.M.C.A. known" among those who go abroad".
